Blood Donors To Red Cross Plan Provide 250 Pts.

Following a meeting May 19 of the Blood Program Committee, which was attended by the County Community Chairman, Mrs. O. C. Halvorson, Chairman of the Washington County Chapter, American Red Cross, National Blood Program reports four Bloodmobile visits in Washington County during the months of April and May.

The first visit was scheduled at Hillsboro on April 4, with 39 productive donors. The second at Beaverton on April 29 with 67 productive donors, the third at Tigard, May 2 with 79 productive donors and the fourth at Forest Grove on May 11 with 65 productive donors.

Hillsboro was under the direction of Mrs. O. C. Halvorson serving as Hillsboro co-chairman with Mrs. E. K. McKoy as Recruitment Chairman, Mrs. L. H. Hewitt, Volunteer Services chairman was in charge of Volunteers staffing the Bloodmobile visit.

Mrs. R. S. Welsh and Mrs. G. G. Brinsley, Beaverton co-chairman; Mrs. John Fredericks, Tigard Chairman and Mrs. Wm. Bricker, Forest Grove Chairman arranged for the visits and recruitment of donors.

There were 1243 hours spent on recruitment by volunteer workers. In addition there were unreported hours given on newspaper publicity, speakers who talked throughout the county and other public information services.

There were 509 hours of volunteer services given by 90 volunteers staffing the Mobile unit visits. A total of 250 productive donors resulted in 250 pints of blood. A total of 36 pints of blood have been used to date in County Hospitals which includes 6 pints of rate O Rh Neg and 2 pints of AB positive.

The Chairman is pleased at the increasing number of donors at each Mobile Visit which, it is felt, is the result of Public Information, so that citizens feel the need of giving blood and also see the results among their friends and relatives when the blood is available. So far blood has been available only on an emergency basis—only 25 to 50% has been supplied. As time goes on it is anticipated that each mobile visit will be 100% in the recruitment of donors and it is hoped that blood will then be available to the doctors for their patients and there will be surplus so that plasma and blood derivatives will also be available.

Two mobile visits are scheduled for October, one in Forest Grove and one in Hillsboro.
