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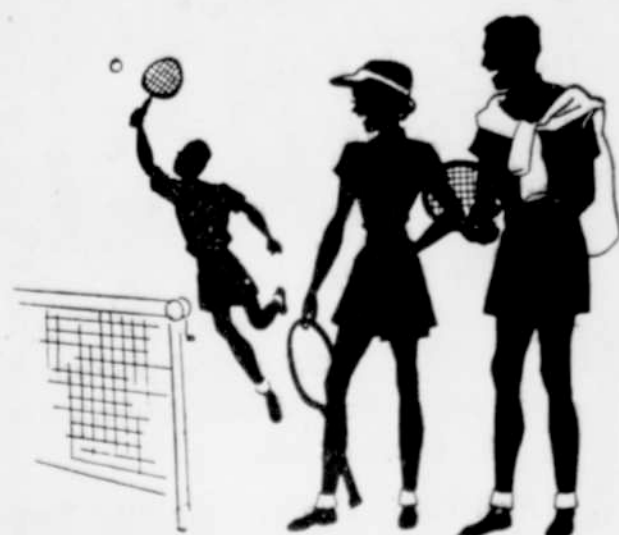
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County Fair Asks Club to Sponsor Fall Floral Show

LAWN BARBERS CALLED

In McMinnville, the call has been sounded for all lawn barbers, in a second edition of what is hoped to be an annual competition.

As told by the TELEPHONE-REGISTER, the city's Men's Garden club has scheduled a list of cash prizes and choice plants which will go to top contestants in a "better lawns" contest.

Judges will inspect all registered lawns and will come to their decisions on the basis of general lawn condition, mowing and trim, freedom of weeds, landscape and curb conditions as well as improvements made during the contest, which runs from June thru September.

The contest is strictly on a home-garden level and professional entries will not be eligible for prizes. Last year's event drew 78 contestants and occasioned widespread comment throughout the state. (To say nothing of the boost it must have given the water department!)

FERDINAND RIDES AGAIN

From Oregon City comes the stirring news that Ferdinand the bull will ride again.

According to the BANNER-COURIER, the Rose Festival theme for the city's parade float entry will be based around the song famed Walt Disney character whose heart overflowed at the sight of flowers.

PUBLIC POWER APPEAL

If a delegation of LaGrande chamber of commerce executives gains its objective, public power will extend into Eastern Oregon.

Told in the Eastern Oregon REVIEW is the appeal by the area for a 20,000 volt extension of the Bonneville main transmission system which would furnish a minimum of 150,000 kw electric energy.

The proposed high voltage transmission line would be of the same size as the lines now serving Portland, Vancouver and Spokane, as well as the heavy industries in these areas.
