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School District Picks Directors June 20 Election

School District No. 48, Beaverton, has set the date of June 20 for new directors to be elected to the district school board, the same time set for the vote to exceed the six percent limitation.

The term of Norton Peek, who has served as chairman of the board for the past two years, will

expire and his successor will be elected for a term of 5 years. The second vacancy occurred with the resignation of Maurice Romig and his position has been temporarily filled by the appointment of Merwyn Palmer. This position is for a two year term.

To be eligible for membership on the board a person must be 21 years of age, a registered voter, and a resident of the school district for six months. Nomination for the position is by petition and the necessary petitions may be

Statistics Mount Up Near End of TYV Baseball Play

JIM PETERSEN, TIGARD MOUNDSMAN, RATES THIRD
IN LEAGUE HITTING AVERAGES; TEAM IS FOURTH

With the TYV league season all but over, Oregon City's powerful hitting Max Kendig appears a "shoo-in" for the league batting championship. Max has rapped out 16 hits in 26 times at the plate for a .616 average.

Jim Nierman, who has either led the league or been in second place almost from the first week of the

season, managed to stay in the runner-up spot through the first 12 rounds of play with 20 for 40 and a .500 mark. Al Bauer, teammate of Kendig's on the championship ball club, is in fourth, a notch behind Tigard pitcher Jim Petersen, who has been idle the past four or five weeks. Bauer has a .382 average to 444 for Pete.

A pair of Oregon City twirlers are perched atop the pitching department of the league statistics. Jay Davis still has his 4-0 record, while Bob Puderbaugh has a 6-1 record.

In the team hitting, McMinnville's Grizzlies moved into third spot ahead of Tigard. Oregon City is the leader on a .291 average, followed by Hillsboro with .258.
