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Ore. City Walks Off With All Honors In TYV League

FINAL STANDINGS SHOW TEAMS' BATTING STATUS
AS WELL AS INDIVIDUAL HITTING AND PITCHING

Oregon City, coached by Wayne Bauer, not only won the TYV league baseball title this year with an 11-3 record, but captured the team batting, individual hitting and pitching crowns as well.

Max Kendig, Oregon City, who took over the lead in the individual hitting race about mid-season, finished with a .616 average on 16 hits in 26 times at bat, to cop the title in that department. He didn't play the last few weeks of the season because of illness.

Hillsboro's Jim Nierman came in second behind Kendig with 23 hits in 47 times at bat and a .489 average. Jim Peterson, Tigard pitcher, closed in third spot with 8 for 18, and Ron McKichan of Forest Grove was fourth with 18 for 46 and a .391 mark.

Bob Puderbaugh of Oregon City was the top hurler in the circuit with a 6-1 record, including 56 strikeouts and 23 walks. Jay Davis, also of O.C., finished in second place with a 4-1 mark. Jim Beard, sophomore right-hander for McMinnville, finished with a 2-0 record on a couple of late-season victories, while Bill Dick-ey of Forest Grove had a 1-0 mark.

Oregon City's .284 was the best team batting mark. The Pioneers collected 110 hits in 387 times at the plate. Hillsboro finished second with 105 for 386 and .272.

Farmer Receives 15% Less Than In Last July Period

Monthly report on the marketing and transportation situation, issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, tells the grim news to farmers that retail cost of farm food products from July 1948 to February of 1949. There was some slight offset through a token increase from February to March.

Compared to last July, farmers now get 15% less from their market dollars—85c instead of a dollar. Meanwhile, marketing charges are down 2%. The consumer's dollar, in March of this year was going 50-50 between producers and marketing agencies.

By percentages, farmers got 6% less while marketing services took 6% more than in last July. This compares to the 1935-39 period, when the division averaged 40 to the farmer and 60 for marketing. However, it also represents the lowest percentage to the farmer since May, 1943.

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For intercity transportation of farm food products, railroad and motor carriers received over 2 billion dollars in 1948. This is an increase of a billion dollars since 1943 and is due, only partly to greater volume. Most of it is traceable to higher rates.

Wheat prospects, meanwhile, continued quite favorable across the nation, with the exception of Pacific states. Warm to hot weather in the Pacific northwest set up an increasing need for moisture. What showers there were during the last of May were characterized as light and very spotty.

Prairie provinces of Canada are also badly in need of rain to promote germination and growth. Corn does well, with over half of the crop planted in the principal corn belt of the United States. Pastures in the Pacific states vary from poor to good conditions. But nationwide, livestock are making good gains.

Skeeter Control Plus New Drugs Combat Malaria

One of the important medical achievements to come out of the past war was the increased knowledge of preventing malaria and the development of new drugs for the treatment of the disease.

Despite the great progress made against malaria, it is estimated that the disease still causes 5,000 deaths in the United States annually. But this rate is bound to decrease because of the improvements made in anti-malarial drugs and development of new ways to get rid of malaria mosquitoes as the result of intensive wartime and postwar research. There is only one way that a person gets malaria, and that is from the bite of an infected female anopheles mosquito, which transmits the germ from one person to another. No one can catch malaria from another person directly, not even from a person seriously ill with malaria.

Since this is true, one of the best ways of preventing malaria is by control of the mosquito which spreads it. This means the community's prompt action in draining and disinfecting areas where that mosquito might breed—swamps, damp ground and pools of excess rain water. Great success has already been attained in this and other countries by spraying DDT and other insecticides on mosquito-infested areas.

There are several kinds of malaria. The most common form is the type with attacks recurring every other day. Symptoms of an attack include chills, fever and sweating, and a general feeling of being ill. The attacks leave the victims weak and unable to do a good day's work. Proper medical care usually makes the attacks disappear, altho some time after treatment has been stopped a relapse may occur, requiring another course of treatment.

Whenever the symptoms of malaria occur, the doctor should be consulted. The newly improved drugs are more helpful than ever to malaria patients, both in initial and recurring attacks, but they must only be taken on medical advice and under medical supervision.

Malaria still takes an enormous toll of lives annually in many nations, especially in tropical climates. But as our advances in antimalarial drugs and in control measures against the anopheles mosquito are adopted in more nations, deaths from malaria will greatly decrease.
