STORY OF HARD LUCK

In a volunteer bankruptcy proceedings filed by a McMinnville firm a story of hard luck and heavy odds is related.

According to the TELEPHONE REGISTER, a truck line which had been serving the area for the past 20 years finds itself on the losing end of a long fight. By voluntarily declaring itself bankrupt, however, it extends the jobs of some 11 men working out of its McMinnville office and also puts itself into a position of paying its way out of the long, dark red.

The company's growth had been steady. Prospects looked bright until three years ago, when a disastrous fire destroyed its warehouse, and the firm became liable for approximately \$10,000 cargo fire loss which was beyond coverage provision in its fire insurance policy.

Further deterioration of operating capital was occasioned by last winter's heavy snows and the subsequent shutdown of many businesses it served.

But the business men of McMinnville seem to be even more concerned over the possible loss of transportation service than their immediate debts. Expressions of patience and confidence in the bankrupt firm give hope of a brighter ending.

For the month of April, the firm showed a profit, before being forced into receivership.

BRINGS CLOSER TIE

The efforts of an exchange teacher in the Sellwood district to understand the United States, in turn, brought a closer tie of the community with her native land, South Wales.

Readers of the Sellwood-Moreland BEE learned of the approaching return of a Welch teacher to her homeland, after one year of teaching in Oregon.

The story brought out some differences in the teaching situation, here and there. For instance, American schools require more clerical work, cover a wider scope yet are not as thorough as the British system, the teacher believes.

In Wales, children enter kindergarten at the age of three, infants' school at five and to junior school at eleven.

The central heating system here, the visitor found, was uncomfortably warm for her habits. The abundance of electric lights and signs, the plentifulness and variety of foods were a source of wonder and awe to her.

In the Sellwood community, it was noted, the teacher had done much toward a better understanding between her country and this one.

MONOPOLY TREND

Oswegoans are wondering if it was a game of Monopoly, really, that occurred recently right under their noses.

At any rate, as reviewed by the REVIEW, the president of the Oswego state bank underwent a flying trip to San Francisco to testify before the Federal Reserve board on the offer made by Transamerica Corp. to buy out the city's bank.

It seems this indicates a monopolistic tendency upon the part of the many-armed financial corp.

PUT NICKEL IN SLOT

After all the uproar about slot machines in Columbia county, the people of St. Helens blinked their optics and rubbed their eyes when they found that the federal government, itself, had installed a nickel, dime and 15-cent slot machine right out in the open.

The SENTINEL-MIST explains it by a report on the installation, in the U. S. Post Office lobby, of an automatic stamp vending slot machine. Set up as a convenience to after-hour patrons as well as those who would otherwise need stand in line, the device dispenses stamps at face value, according to the slot used.

Five cents gets you five 1 cent stamps. Ten gets you five 2 cent stamps and fifteen cents nets five three cent stamps.

The machine underwent severe tests to meet specifications set up by the postal department and the national bureau of standards.

At the outset, the stamp vendors will be placed in post offices exclusively. But as they become more available, they may be set up in department stores, hotels, apartment houses and like concerns where stamps are commonly sold as service to patrons or employees.

EXIT RIPPLES

Artistic ripples along certain parking strips in Gresham are on the way out.

Announced by the OUTLOOK was the word that burning and resurfacing operations along the parking strips were due to commence.

Parking operations, meanwhile, will be "interrupted" with plenty of smoke driving motorists to safer haven.

PEOPLE WOULDN'T VOTE

It was just another case of the same old story in Clackamas county, according to figures released in Oregon City, in regard to the recent special election on a proposed county road levy.

The BANNER COURIER shows that the people just wouldn't vote on the matter, some 7,392 ballots coming from a total registration of 35,096.

"HAPPY DAYS" PLANS

There'll be "Happy Days" again in Hillsboro, come the fourth of July.

The ARGUS relates the plans for the annual celebration at shut park are progressing toward an event which will even surpass those of previous years. Four full days, from the first through the fourth of July, will offer a variety of highlights.

In areas where there had been an intensive campaign to explain the road program, the vote was heavily in favor of it. Where there had been no meetings on the matter, opposition was rampant.

Boosters for good roads in the county, however, were reported gathering strength for an even more determined effort to get Clackamas out of the mud again.

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
