The big push is on for completion of Beaverton's float entry for the Portland Rose Festival parade, which will begin Friday morning at 10 a.m. and the job is expected to extend around the clock from Thursday afternoon until the wee hours of Friday morning, announces Jack Weiby, chairman of the Beaverton junior chamber of commerce committee.

There exists urgent need for flowers and volunteer help on decorating the float. Experience, on the latter, is highly desirable but entirely unnecessary.

Flowers should be brought in cardboard boxes and, except for roses, should be thoroughly wetted. Roses should best be picked after 4 p.m. and deadline on flowers is Thursday midnight.

Rose Festival buttons are still on sale by the JCC sponsoring organization. The entire proceeds from this sale, except for government tax, will go for the costs of building the float.

W. Slope Water Situation Gets Back to Normal

After a hectic three days, with West Slope water users on short rations, the situation aggravated by a broken pump house, fitting has been remedied and distribution of water again is back to normal, according to George J. Davis, engineer of the district.

Wednesday the pump was back in shape and everything pointed to normal resumption of business by Wednesday night. The broken fitting had soaked the motors and grounded them out. Repair was effected by drying the motors in ovens. Meanwhile, the district was served only by a small emergency line linking it to the Portland system.

Residents in the Sylvan, Cedar Hills, Raleigh, West Slope and fringe of Beaverton, during the shortage, were urged to refrain from sprinkling or using large quantities of water.

"Trouble?" Davis said. "We've had plenty of it. Some people didn't get any water and some seemed to get too much. We're glad to have it squared away."

Another headache looming, Davis relates, is the necessity of moving the district's water tanks and mains at the proposed cloverleaf improvement on top of the hill at Sylvan.

He relates that the district is awaiting a new location of water mains, to be designated by the state. The state will also purchase the present water tank, negotiations for which are underway.

The highway project is slated for early in 1951 and the district has from now to the end of 1950 to get their lines relocated.

Special Levy Election Set For June 29

MAYOR URGES OKAY BY VOTERS TO KEEP CITY IN OPERATION

A special election for approval of a levy of \$16,565.56 in excess of the 6% limitation clause, will be held at the city hall by voters of Beaverton on June 29. Mayor H. H. Jeffries, in connection with this announcement, urges wide participation by legal voters and points out that only by their approval will the city be able to continue in operation.

In spite of the remarkable increase of valuation in the city during recent years, state regulation of taxation within the 6% limitation on increased tax base would only provide a little more than \$8,000 without approval by the voters. This, the mayor points out, would give the city but \$666 per month with which to carry out the development of the city.

Budget figures for the coming year represent no increase in levy over last year. However, for vital services agreed to, the sum of \$16,565.56 will be required in addition to the amount with the 6% clause.

Jeffries urges every citizen within the city to support the measure. Non-taxpayers are of course entitled to vote, as well. Heavy weather damage to city streets, the need to purchase additional equipment and the need to supplement the general fund is the explanation for the levy.

Named to serve as an election board are: Mabel Goyt and Helma McKercher, judges, and Iva Summers, Laura Grauer and Dora Stipe, clerks.

The council, by resolution, approved adoption of the city budget. Next meeting of the council has been set for June 13, at 7:30 p. m.

State Hearing On Milk Price Cut Dated June 16th

A public hearing to consider revision of minimum prices paid producers for fluid milk and wholesale and retail prices to consumers in the Washington County Marketing Area will be held at Hillsboro, Oregon at the City Hall, June 16, 1949, at the hour of 1:30 p.m., according to notices issued by the Milk Control Section, State Department of Agriculture.

Melvin J. Conklin, Examiner for the Department is in charge of the hearing which is expected to establish official data for minimum milk and cream price schedules under conditions now prevailing in this area.

The Washington County hearing is one of a series being held by the State Department of Agriculture to investigate costs and other factors affecting the production and distribution of milk in the bottle and can trade.
