## Odds and Ends of Council Meeting

### WEED ORDINANCE

The city is in for an outbreak of weed cutting or other means of removing grass, thistles, cockleburrs or other uncultivated brush plants and other growths, judging the temper of the council meeting. Ordinance 188 prohibits such growths within 100 feet of any street or road in the city of Beaverton, except when such is cultivated for ornamental or food purposes.

It is expected that a deadline will soon be set, for around July 15, after which penalties will be assessed to all property owners who have not trimmed down such rank growths.

### CITY'S GRASS TRIMMING

The city has its own grass cutting problems, from curbs to travelled roadways, it would seem.

The council authorized Fred Goyt to arrange for the hire of a local man whose tractor is equipped for just such purposes. It was stated that the one man with special equipment could do the job faster and at cheaper rate than could the city with its ponderous weed-cutting devices.

### SEWER PLANT START

Things are about to "bust wide open" in the matter of constructing the sanitary sewage treatment plant. Contractor has applied for a four inch water line to the plant site, signalling pending start of the project.

Pipe is on hand and the council has ordered the installation to be made.

### NOTE OF PRAISE

To the city council has come a refreshing letter—a note of praise. Communication sent from the Beaverton grade school superintendent Errol Hassell, has words of kindness for the city fathers in their hiring of a day policeman.

A safer town for youngsters is Mr. Hassell's belief through the day cop and he congratulates the council in choice of officer.

### FIRE DEPT. TANK

Not recalling the old story of "locking the barn after the horse has gone astray" the city is casting about for means by which some control may be had over the city gas pump.

Plan is to install a tank underground, outside the fire station. A pump will be set up inside the station and gas for the trucks will thus be accounted.

Of course, there are no accusations whatever. But it seems that too many individuals have keys to the present gas supply and it seems like quite a task to determine just where the monthly gasoline really goes.

### ERICKSON CHAPTER

Another chapter in the story of Erickson avenue, subtitled "Horrible Road" was previewed at the council by the street superintendent, for the enlightenment of councilman Oscar Martin.

Now will come an application of light dusting oil which, the city fervently hopes, will help control the rolling bundles of dust that attend each car's trip down the thoroughfare.

Of all the "improved" streets in Beaverton, the situation on Erickson street has fostered more complaints and rumblings than any, it is believed. Blame is put on incomplete road building techniques and an unusually severe winter that put the improvement to shame.

A better road is projected, for the future.
