"Western Textile Fashions", a 4-day show which the public is invited to attend and which promises to hold much appeal for anyone interested in textiles and how they came to be, will be held in the Portland Oregonian's Hostess House from June 21 through June 24, from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. each day.

Additional opportunity to view the show, which will present a retrospective picture of textile production in Oregon, as well as the current exciting picture of what is being done throughout the state, will be provided on Thursday night from 7 to 10 p.m. The story of how raw wool is translated into finished cloth of various weaves and colors, of how that cloth is translated into suits, coats and other garments, will be told also.

And of additional interest to many will be the hand-loomed display, which will include a hand loom from the Oregon Ceramic studio in operation, as well as finished pieces, shown in contrast to the hand-loomed of pioneer days. . . an exhibit made possible through cooperation of the Oregon Historical society.

Members of the Oregonian staff have been working weeks in advance with the textile people of Oregon to prepare as colorful and comprehensive of the textile picture as possible, and it is a picture, The Oregonian feels, of a monumental job stemming from pioneer days up to the present time that the display will tell.

Traffic Deaths Decline; Oregon Leading Nation

Oregon's sharp decrease in 1949 traffic deaths gained momentum during May with a tentative total of 25 fatalities compared to 44 in the same month last year, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported today.

The year's death toll to date stands at 96, a reduction 35 percent from 149 at the same time last year. This figure is the lowest since 1944, when traffic volumes were less than half their present level, Newberry said.

Only three of the May fatalities occurred in cities, two in Pendleton and one in Medford. Portland and Multnomah county were death-free for the second consecutive month.

"Although the drop in deaths is most spectacular, it is equally gratifying to see that the number of accidents and injuries has also declined," the secretary said. "Too often this side of the picture is overlooked in concentrating on a temporary reduction in fatalities."

He said Oregon is leading the nation in reducing traffic deaths and called for continued effort from motorists and enforcement agencies to prevent a recurrence of last year's experience, when 219 persons lost their lives in the five heavily-traveled summer months.

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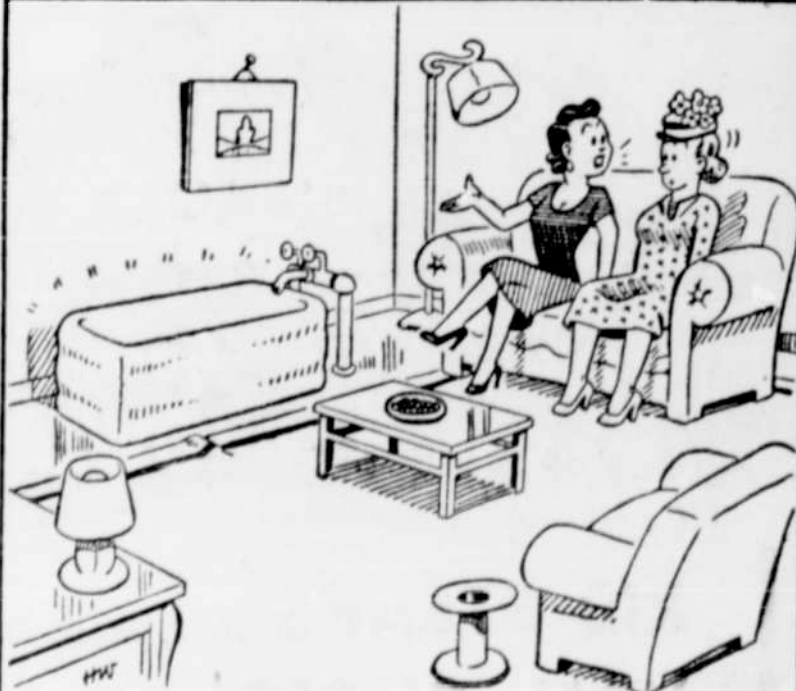
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
