Beaverton Rates New Equipment, 1st Class Status

Along with official status as a first class office, the Beaverton Postoffice is in the process of installing 39 cases of new, government-owned furniture and new office equipment, declares Donald L. Jenkins, acting postmaster. The new installation will be complete, with new postoffice boxes, desks, partitions and all.

Shipping cost of the equipment amounted to almost \$1,000 and all present furniture will be replaced. There will be three service windows, instead of two and the total shipment weighed about 4 tons.

Present fixtures will be removed from the postoffice and placed in storage for Mrs. Ruth M. Newton, Route 2, Hillsboro, from whom the government rented them.

Box rent, Jenkins says, will be collected upon installation of the new equipment.

Effective July 1, Beaverton's first class status becomes official. Money orders will be available from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. week days. Stamps, parcel post and general delivery service will remain at the hours of 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays.

Effort is also being made to improve house-to-house delivery service to allow twice-a-day service.

Library Friends Make Survey On Bookmobile Need

Meeting in Hillsboro and including representatives from Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Cherry Grove, Sherwood, Beaverton, Tigard, Tualatin and Sherwood. Friends of the Library have been conducting a quiet survey to determine whether or not Washington county residents desire a county library and bookmobile system.

R. E. Wiley, of Hillsboro, is chairman of the group and Mrs. Alfred Meyer, Cherry Grove, acts as secretary. Directors and members include: Mrs. E. F. Leming, North Plains; L. W. Marshall, Forest Grove; John Cox, Hillsboro; I. R. Metzler, Beaverton; Mrs. George Laver, Banks; Mrs. Eva A. Moore and P. E. Lewis, Tigard; W. V. McKinney, Mrs. J. W. Bailey and Mrs. H. I. Linn of Hillsboro; Miss Elsie Lundborg Pacific University; Mrs. Roland T. Dustan, Tualatin and Mrs. A. E. Sherk, Sherwood.

The group, at a recent meeting, declared they found almost universal sentiment for a county library system in Washington county. The library sponsors, thus encouraged, told plans to enlarge its membership under the name of "Friends of the Library" and work for intensive consideration of the project.

A good library, the sponsors point out, is in truth the People's University, promoting good citizenship, through stimulating intelligent public opinion. The venture is believed worthwhile for everyone in all walks of life, young and old.

For the service proposed, main housing would be at the county seat. From here books would go into distribution into all parts of the county lacking a library center. Telephone and mail services would be maintained for rural routes. Bookmobile stops would be made according to announced schedules.

A county library is an agency of the government and as such is established and maintained by the county under provisions of state law. The mobile unit of the library is considered a highly important factor of the setup in that it brings to rural residents the same service and reading opportunities as are available in the city.
