Model Planes Of State Invited To Eugene Contests

Oregon's third annual model plane contest will be held July 16 and 17 at Eugene, according to an announcement by Plymouth dealers of Oregon, sponsors of the contest. The tournament is open to all young people from ages nine to 26 years.

Prizes will include three scholarships to any Oregon college or university. First prize will be a \$750 scholarship. Second and third prizes will be scholarships of \$500 and \$250 respectively. These awards will be to winners from 14 to 18 years of age only.

In addition to the scholarships there will be presented four all-expense trips to Detroit, Mich., where contestants will compete in the August 22-29 Third International Model Plane Contest for \$8750 in prizes. Further awards at the Eugene meet will be prizes of the day as well as trophies for contestants in all groups.

Arrangements have been made in Eugene to hold control line events on the University of Oregon campus on Saturday, July 16, featuring speed and stunt flying. Free flight events by gasoline-motored and rubber-powered models will be held Sunday, July 17, at the Eugene airport. Model plane meets have always been popular with onlookers and details for handling spectators as well as contestants are now being worked out.

DOCK WALLPERS JOY

Longshoremen in St. Helens are about to enjoy the fruit of a long running deal which gives them a summer vacation.

The SENTINEL-MIST relates that approximately \$5,000 will be paid out to local dock wallpers this year. Vacation pay is based on hours worked in 1948.

For those who built up a total of 896 hours in the year's span, some 53 hours at the rate of \$1.80 per hour or a total of about \$100 will be paid.

The men will take their vacations in rotation, in order to leave a sufficient number to load such vessels as shipping schedules require.

Her height is 5'6"; bust 34"; waist 24"; weight 118 lbs; hair brown; eyes hazel. The composite stacks up similarly except in weight of 124 3/8 and blue eyes.

"Miss McMinnville" received a list of valuable merchandise prizes along with her honor-designation and will look forward to an expense-free trip to Seaside where she will parade her charms in the state elimination.

WATERSHED FOLLOWUP

There's a bit of this "up in arms" business in Oregon City, following a published charge that its chamber of commerce neatly avoided logging operations on the city's watershed, during a recent forest tour.

Now, declares the BANNER COURIER arrangements have been completed for the court to fully investigate charges made by a county sanitarian that logging operations on the South Fork of the Clackamas river endanger the water supply of the city.
