Secretary of Agriculture, Charles Brannan has presented to Congress a program which in principle provide ways and means for the farmer to help themselves through better production methods, and,

Whereas:

The Brannan plan is the nearest approach to the security we need, ever presented therefore be it,

Resolved:

That Cedar Mill Local 229 of the Oregon State Farmers Union favor the principles embodied in the Brannan bill and urge our Congressmen to work for the passage of the Brannan bill.

Resolution Hits PUC Approval of Rate Increases

RESOLUTION

Whereas: The prices of farm products have shown a steady decline for a number of months and net income is at a point where many farmers are confronted with the necessity of leaving their farms or seeking supplemental employment.

Whereas:

The Public Utilities Commissioner of Oregon has recently granted substantial increases in rates to many power communications and transportation companies without regard to general trend of lowering prices.

Therefore:

Be it resolved that we, the Washington County Farmers Union go on record as opposing this action of the Public Utilities Commissioner in increasing rates.

And be it further resolved: That we press our efforts for the direct election of the Public Utilities Commissioner by the people instead of appointment by the Governor, and that copies of this resolution be sent to the Governor, to the Public Utilities Commissioner and to the press.

Tualatin Aquatic Specialist Works At Roamer's Rest

William F. Gillam of Tualatin returned June 25 from Camp Longfellow, Wild Cat Lake near Bremerton, Washington, where he has been attending an American Red Cross Aquatic School on a scholarship from Washington County Chapter.

The purpose of the Aquatic schools is to provide trained Aquatic leaders for schools, camps recreation and part departments, youth organizations and Red Cross Chapters. Enrolled men and women agree to instruct others after they complete the course. They receive intensive ten day Instructor training in Life Saving, Swimming, Diving and Small Craft operation, First Aid and Accident Prevention.

Mr. Gillam has had a great deal of experience in Aquatics, receiving his Sr. Life Saving Emblem at the American Red Cross Pool at Shattuck School in Portland. He is now serving as a life guard at Roamer's Rest and his services will be available for other aquatic instruction in the county.

Other Red Cross trained instructors are Robert Gillam, Wallace Thomas and Ray Thomas in the Tigard-Tualatin area, the organization says.
