**OWNERSHIP REPORT**  
E. N. Murner, deputy county assessor who has been retained by the city of Beaverton, presented a preliminary report on a large size job—determining property ownership within the sewer's area to lay the ground-work for city assessment. Mr. Murner has discovered instances of lots without any access to proposed sewer lines. The city is now considering the addition of stub lines to serve such cases. Additions will also be made to the drainage area served by the proposed storm sewer system. This will include ditches which lead into storm sewer inlets.

**INDUSTRIAL SITES**  
To tax or not to tax seems to be the burning question, at the Tuesday meeting, in regard to the railroad company tracks and sewer assessments.

The Southern Pacific, for instance, has some total of 3460 feet along side sewer lines. The big puzzle was justification in laying a tax for this sewer installation.

From the sidelines came a report that the city of Medford in its sewer construction, allegedly made a point of extending its lines to railroad property, with resulting taxation.

The idea is not all take, however. There's a bit of give to the picture, too. Sewer installation increases the desirability of railroad property as modern industrial sites.

**HALL ST. CROSSING**  
Condemnation of about one third of a garage on the east side of Hall street, belonging to Mr. Mailer is looked for as the Hall street crossing of the Tualatin Valley Highway (Canyon Road, that is) moves into final stages.

**WATER EXTENSION**  
Accepted by the city council is a contract providing for an extension of water line to the property of Mrs. Bonnie Grimm, on S. W. Menlo Drive.

The deal includes an arrangement for future connections by whomsoever gets around to it is payment to Mrs. Grimm to reimburse her for expense of putting in the line.

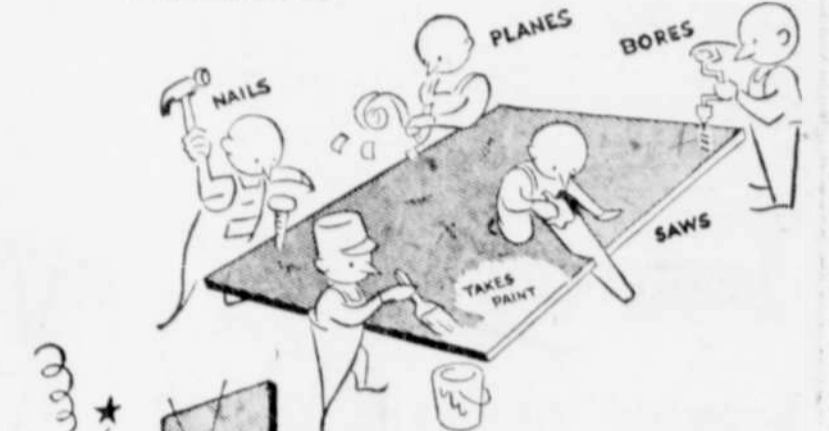
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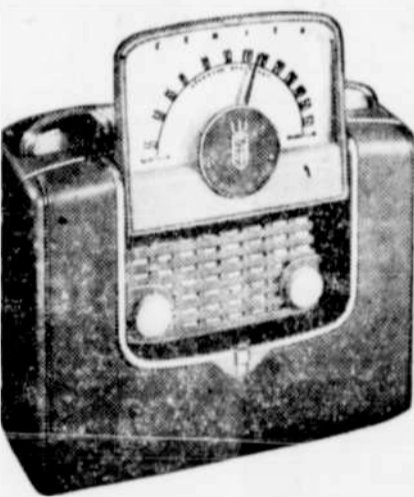
