With the grand opening scheduled for Wednesday evening, July 6, the Beaverton area's Teen-age recreation center on the ground floor of the Grange hall, great enthusiasm is rising over the establishment, according to report.

Tuesday night, 43 teenagers were present at a meeting in the new center where final plans were drawn up for the opening ceremonies.

Most of the furnishings have been obtained, some by purchase and some by donations. Equipment includes pool table, juke box, 'coke' cabinet and other items.

Meanwhile, the district's summer recreational program is going along in good style, declares Mrs. Mildred Miller, supervisor. Last Thursday, 105 youngsters went to Couch school for a swim session and this activity will be conducted each Thursday.

Every Friday night, teen-age dances are held in the grade school gymnasium, with official hosts and hostesses appointed to handle details.

More volunteers are needed in the small fry activities, on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 9 to 11 a. m. This program has become so popular that more help is needed to supervise it.

CITY TRIES BUDGET AGAIN

**Election Leaves Finances
In Lurch By Adverse Vote**

**COUNCIL ASKS FOR RESIGNATION OF RECORDER
IN ROUGH AND TUMBLE MEETING ON JULY 5TH**

In a rough and tumble presentation, July 5, in the city hall, the Beaverton city council voted to have another try at passage of the budget for the fiscal year, to overcome the adverse vote on the issue, June 29, when 124 voters declared by 47 votes "For" and 77 votes "Against" their wishes.

Mayor H. H. Jeffries, explaining to a packed council chambers that the city had only \$8,000 per year, or about \$666 a month, in its treasury, put through reductions in salaries to trim the repudiated figure of \$16,656.56.

Part of the decision to start all over again, with budget committee meetings, advertisements, hearings and election, seemed tied up in the resignation of L. J. Busse as city recorder. This was asked by the mayor, without charges, for the good of the city's business.

The room was packed with about 45 citizens who, when asked by the mayor, expressed unanimous accord with this request. Of the council, only councilman Paul Taggart seemed particularly reluctant in going along with the mayor's wish.

Oscar Martin made the resignation motion and Milton Metcalfe offered the second. The final vote for ousting the recorder was unanimous.

The recorder's resignation was ordered effective at the conclusion of the meeting and to replace him has been hired J. E. Paddock, 545 Hall street, Beaverton, who is a former mayor of Oakridge.

Meanwhile, the city council has gone ahead with preparation of a new budget, first legal publication of which starts in this week's issue. Public hearing will be July 29 and the election is set for the following day, July 30.

Preliminary to new budget considerations, Mayor Jeffries cut salaries of city employees back to the level they were prior to the last pay raise. Under that schedule, Henry Mayfield, police chief, gets \$225; Archie Olson, fire chief, \$250; Fred Goyt, city superintendent, \$275; recorder, \$275 and city hall stenographer, \$150.

A vacation policy was set for all employees of the city which gives them one week off after 12 months' service, two weeks after three years. There will be no pay in lieu of vacations in the future, it was voted by the council.

Salaries are spread over four divisions. From the water and sewer departments, which are self supporting, they represent payment in lieu of tax to the city while the portion from general and road tax funds must be included in money raised by assessment.

Fire department statements, submitted at the meeting, lists payment due up to June 30. West Slope calls amounted to \$46, Beaverton, \$43 and rural, \$254.

Fire chief Olson offered to take up with the firefighters their willingness to await payment on money earned until a new budget is approved and money is available for distribution.

**Citizens Besiege Council
On Sewer Connection Beef**

**FIRST PAYMENT DEMAND MADE BY CONTRACTORS
TO COUNCIL; WILL HOLD BACK 15% OF AMOUNTS**

Beaverton citizens, up in arms over the pending connection of house sewage systems to the sewer collection mains or branches, besieged the city council, Tuesday night, at the regular meeting.

Understanding of the council is that the contractor wants to either put the line from the collection lines to the house system or nothing at all, it was declared. After much discussion, pro and con, it was brought out that the sewer lines do not branch out to property lines. That work must be done, and be paid for, by the property owner.

When lines are on the side of the street, connection charge is the same as though it were in the middle of the street, it was said.

Carl Green, engineer of John Cunningham and Associates sanitary engineering firm retained by the city, reported that job estimates were for sewer line in streets, including "y's" for connection with house discharges. But no provision had been made for extension to the property line or fronting buildings.

If the city would wish it, Green added, he believed the contractor would be willing to negotiate for sewer line extensions to reach the property line. He warned, however, that this would mean a greater expenditure of money, although the job would have to be done by private expense, otherwise.

Estimates for first payments on the sewer job were submitted for council approval and disbursement. For storm and sewer, the Salem Sand and Gravel company asked for payment of \$600, less 15 percent retained pending completion of the contract, or \$510 net. On the sanitary sewer, payment will be for \$7,229.50, less 15 percent, or \$6,145.08.

Jacobson Brittan, on construction of the sewage treatment plant, ask first payment of \$3,357, less 15 percent, or \$2,853.45.

E. N. Murner, who is completing a report on square footage ownership for branch sewer assessment, brought a problem to the council, in asking for a ruling as to assessment against alleyways. It seems there are three in the city.

On the alley from First avenue to Farmington road, next to the post office, Murner wanted to know whether it should be assessed as private property. Although it has been in use for 30 years, there seems to be no evidence that the thoroughfare has been dedicated for public use.

The council voted to put the matter on ice, pending further legal information on procedure.

M. Kaiser, newly appointed inspector, was informed that his income would rest entirely upon fees. For each connection to the sewer that he inspects, he will be given \$1, while each inspection on new construction will also net him one dollar.

The law provides: "It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle other than one of official business to follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm, closer than 500 feet or to drive such vehicle within 3 blocks where fire fighting apparatus has stopped in answer to a fire alarm."
