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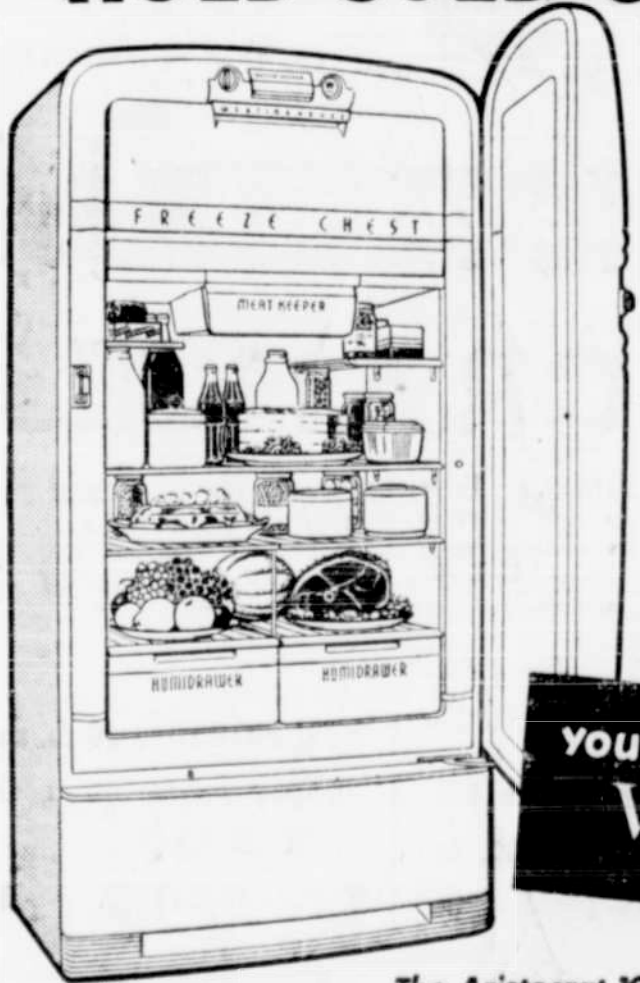
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LARGE, COLORFUL WEDDING AT PORTLAND MANOR, JUNE 12TH

Jobless Claims Average 300 At Hillsboro Setup

In the newly established, full-time office of the Oregon Unemployment Compensation office, an average of approximately 300 claims to jobless are processed each week, according to Alvin Elkins, manager. The new office, to which the farm-labor employment service has been joined on a permanent basis, is operating on a harvest season schedule from 6 a. m. to 5 p. m. Normally hours will be between 8 a. m. and 5 p. m.

Personnel at the new state office numbers eight. Willis L. Cady, of Beaverton, is supervisor of unemployment compensation claims and Mrs. Evelyn Korn, of Beaverton, is stenographer. Statistics from Washington county under the new setup, will be listed separately in all surveys of the labor market as put out by the state service.

Hillsboro is equipped to handle all veteran readjustment claims, state and interstate claims as well as offering complete employment services for general and farm-labor seekers.

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
