Policy Renewal Adds 5 More Yrs. To GI Insurance

Tualatin Valley veterans are reminded that National Service Life Insurance policies must be renewed, or converted to a permanent insurance plan.

The Veterans Administration is now sending out notices of expiration to some veterans in the area. Policies issued before January 1, 1946, expire eight years from date of issue. Those issued after that date expire in five years.

All term policies may be renewed for an additional five years, as provided by law. Veterans must fill out a renewal application form and mail it to the V.A. before the expiration of their policies. The first premium payment must also accompany the application.

Premiums will be slightly higher than on the previous policy since they are based on the age of the veteran at the time of renewal. No physical examination is necessary except in cases where the policy has been lapsed for a longer period than three months.

Veterans who wish to convert their policies to permanent insurance will find six standard plans available. They are: Ordinary life, 20-pay life, 30-pay life, 20-year endowment, endowment at age 60 and endowment at age 65.

Full information on insurance benefits may be obtained at any V.A. office.
