Portland U. Signs Two Assistants And Grid Trainer

Portland, Ore. (Special)—The signing of two assistant football coaches and a trainer by University of Portland's athletic committee this week put Head Coach Harry Wright's staff at full strength for the opening of the Pilots grid campaign next September.

New assistant coaches are Floyd Simmons, former Notre Dame fullback and professional star, who will instruct backfield men and Joe Tedeschi, ex-Pilot guard, who will serve as freshman football coach. New full-time trainer will be August Pellino, who starred for Niagara university and served as trainer at Aquinas Institute, Rochester, N. Y. when Wright was head coach there from 1946 to 1949.

Simmons, a native Portlander, performed for two years on the Irish eleven. After graduation from Notre Dame he signed with the Chicago Rockets of the All-American professional league where he played for one season. He is a former All-City griddler from Portland's Jefferson high school.

Tedeschi is the only Portland graduate on the coaching staff. He was a three-year letter-winner for the Pilots, alternating at guard and tackle for the late Robert "Matty" Mathews. He acquired considerable coaching experience in Jersey City, N. J., his home town, where he guided several teams to league championships.

A licensed chiropractor, Pellino attended both Louisiana State and Niagara universities. At Niagara he played three years of varsity basketball and is considered one of the all-time great athletes of that school.

With the addition of the three new members, Portland's coaching staff will include Head Coach Wright and Line Coach Neil Green, another ex-Notre Dame football performer.

TENTATIVE TAGS FOR ANTELOPES OFFERED

July 14, 1949

C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game Supervisor, announced today that applications, on a tentative basis, for antelope tags should be mailed to the Oregon State Game Commission office in Portland at once.

The proposed antelope season for this year in Oregon is only tentative as regulations will not be final until July 23. The early dates of the proposed season, however, make it necessary for hunters wishing to participate to mail applications at an early date, Mr. Lockwood stated.

The tentative hunting regulations call for a limited antelope hunt with 1,000 tags to be issued. If more than that number of applications are received, a public drawing will be held to determine the successful applicants. Applications for tags may be made on regular forms which will be available at all license agencies by the first of next week or by letter.

If application is made by letter, the following information must be included: the applicant's name (printed), his address, the type of license and the license number. No money is to be sent with the application.

As was the practice last year for special seasons, applications will be accepted for individuals or for parties of individuals up to and including four persons. If party applications are made, the proper information must be supplied for each member of the party.

All applications for antelope tags must be in the Game Commission office in Portland, Oregon, by five p. m. July 27.
