

Toledo Divoteer Sets Mark For JCC 'Hole In One'

Setting a mark to be beaten in the Beaverton junior chamber of commerce "Hole-in-One" tournament, A. Leffleman, of Toledo, Oregon, chipped his golf ball to within 21 inches of the cup, to win the daily prize of \$5 on July 31 and to take first rank in contestants for the sweepstake prize to be awarded after August 7.

The tournament, according to Roy E. Olson, chairman, will continue through August 7, being in progress each afternoon from 2 p. m. until dusk.

A cash prize of \$100 is being offered for a hole-in-one. In the event of no such single stroke to fame and riches, a set of irons valued at \$75 will be awarded to the golfer coming closest to the pin. In addition an engraved silver cup will be presented, which must be won three times to be a permanent possession.

The green is 125 yards from the tee. Around the cup is a circle 10 feet in diameter, into which a player must land his ball in order to qualify for any prize.

The small fee for contestants allows the golfer three balls. He may use his own pet clubs or select one from those of the stand. Many, it develops, find quite a lot of difficulty in reaching the qualifying circle, Olson declares.

Last year, the JCC sponsored a Tualatin Valley golf tournament, which attracted entries from all surrounding communities. The "Hole-in-One" tournament, this year, is being staged as a follow-up of the highly successful golf play of 1948.

Fight Continues On Brannan Plan States FU Head

SALEM, ORE.—(Special)—The fight for the Brannan farm plan will go on, despite its setback in Congress, President Ronald E. Jones of the Oregon Farmers Union declared Tuesday on his return from Salt Lake City where he attended a meeting of the executive committee of the National Farmers Union.

Jones also announced that President James G. Patton will be the principal speaker at the annual picnic of the Oregon Farmers Union at Champoug, Sunday, August 21. Patton will speak on "Agriculture in Transition".

"The Brannan plan is not dead," said President Jones. "This needs to be pointed out in view of the attempts of much of the press and many commentators to give such an impression."

"Only one phase of a continuing battle for its adoption has been completed."

"What Congress has done is to continue the old plan of guaranteed profits which insures eventual elimination of working farmers. This is no answer to the farm problem."

"As an organization devoted to the interests of working farmers the Farmers Union can support only such programs as will help people on the farm."

"We are heartened by the magnitude of the support which the Brannan plan is receiving from not only our membership but from family farmers and consumers all over the state. This support has its origin in the grass roots."

"The country wants and needs a program which will promote both producer and consumer interests. Again the Brannan plan pattern provides the answer."

"The American people will never be satisfied with the present ill conceived and inadequate programs. The Farmers Union renews its pledge to continue the fight for a plan so right in principle."

City Passes Ordinance To Authorize Bancroft Bonds

ENGINEER PRESENTS JOB SPECIFICATIONS FOR IMPROVEMENT ON FIRST, WATSON TO STOTT STS.

At a regular meeting of the Beaverton city council an ordinance authorizing the issuance of Bancroft bonds and providing for the issuance of warrants for paying of sewer system installation charges pending collection from taxpayers after completion of the contract, was passed August 1. Estimated cost of the laterals and branch sewers, which the measure concerned, is set at \$121,300 which will be the limit of the Bancroft bond issue.

The council explained to a crowded roomful of citizens that Bancroft bonding or cash payment for laterals benefitting property will not be asked until the city accepts the sewer job as satisfactory, after January 1, 1950. Meanwhile, however, the contractor requires payment according to his contract.

Mayor H. H. Jeffries declared the ordinance will permit warrants to be negotiated similar to a short term loan, pending collection from taxpayers when the installation passes inspection and is accepted by the city.

Engineer McIntyre, of Hillsboro, presented specifications for improvement of First street, from Watson to Stott streets, including storm drainage, curbs and paved surface.

Total estimated cost was set at \$11,397, or \$7 per running foot. Catch basins will be installed on Main for the storm sewer system hookup.

Apparently goaded by declarations of citizens who were present at the meeting, the council ordered the city attorney to prepare a resolution calling for the improvement of Hall street, from Farmington to Watson. This project, it was voiced, has been kicked around for better than three years and the action taken by the council takes the place of petitioning by property owners.

Councilman Taggart reported his inspection of the old Post-office building and the Columbia food market revealed that the joists had dry rotted and are ready to fall in at any time. City superintendent Fred Goyt was ordered to see that necessary repair is made, in accordance with city code.

Recorder Paddock was instructed to write PGE for installation of a street light at the corner of 5th and Angel, near the new Adventist church.

Salary schedules, after much arguing and fanfare, settled down to the following: stenographer, \$165; chief of police, \$235 and \$25 expense; day policeman, \$225 and \$25 expense; fire chief, \$250 and \$50 expense (half paid by the Beaverton Rural Fire Protection district); recorder, \$260; city superintendent, \$275 and \$25 expense and librarian, \$75. All salaries are monthly.

The council adjourned after midnight, until August 8.

Voters Approve City Budget By Margin of 3 - 1

Turning out 393 strong, voters of Beaverton, July 30, overwhelmingly approved the city budget by a margin of 3 to 1 in the second election to provide funds with which to operate the city.

Official election results, as officially announced at the August 1 council meeting, showed the following tally: "Yes," 285; "No," 105; Void, 3. Total votes cast, 392. In the previous vote, on June 29, total votes were 124.

By its official canvass and acceptance of the election board results, the council authorized the mayor to proclaim the passage of the 1949-50 budget, effective at once.

Great consternation reigned at the city hall, following the June 29 repudiation of the budget. Special permission was obtained from the county assessor at Hillsboro to allow preparation of a substitute budget upon which was saddled additional cost of holding the extra election.

MAYOR EXTENDS THANKS FOR VOTERS RESPONSE

The mayor and the city council wish to thank the many citizens who helped inform the public of the need for the budget to pay the every day expenses incurred by the city.

The two-thirds vote at the polls was an endorsement of the economic policy of our city fathers as the city tax was .3 mills less than last year.

ROAD BUILDERS NEAR END ON CANYON ROAD

The grind and roar of the concrete-belching machinery and the snarl of earth ripping devices along Canyon Road have stilled. The contractor charged with the task of widening the highway from West Slope through the city of Beaverton is nearing the day when he can hand over the completed four lane thoroughfare to the travelling public.

Still to be laid, and awaiting the hardening of the last concrete installed are blacktop strips along the shoulders.

According to information received from the office of Porter Yett, who has the improvement contract, the same firm will do blacktopping as soon as both sides may be done in one operation. When all the new concrete has sufficiently cured, it will be possible to wind up the four-lane job.

One of the handicaps, it is reported, has been from the sewer construction job in Beaverton which has required Yett's trucks to detour and lose delivery of from two to three loads of dirt a day, from the rock plant on Scholls Ferry road.

Thirty-four club members from Washington county attended the 4-H livestock and crops tour in Corvallis July 22-30. The tour was held for club members from northern Willamette valley counties. County extension agent, Joe Cox, accompanied the group.

The 4-H boys had an opportunity to visit the livestock and crops department at Oregon State college on the trip. Classes in fitting and showing dairy cattle, sheep, beef and hogs were conducted by college faculty members. Instruction in poultry and an inspection of the poultry plant was another part of the three day program.

Visits were made to the irrigated pastures of the dairy farm and an inspection of new crops being developed on the college experimental farm also was included in the trip.
