BARGAIN TUNA

In Oregon City, by now, housewives have been offered an opportunity to obtain an extra select pack of albacore tuna at bargain prices.

Relates the BANNER-COURIER, the community cannery set August 3 for processing of its annual pack. Prices this year were set at 11 cents below last year's cost.

Housewives who signed to take advantage of the offer, were requested to arrange to work in the packing of cans.

The cannery is a carryover from the war years when the government furnished equipment and in every way encouraged housewives to preserve food of all kinds as a contribution to the war effort. All the summer season, the establishment has been working from one to three days weekly, canning fruit, vegetables and meat.

AIR TRAVEL CAMPAIGN

Faced by the threat of an abandoned airline service, McMinnville gives promise of stirring its stumps to show its dire need of air travel facilities.

The TELEPHONE REGISTER tells of determined efforts to fight down the Civil Aeronautics Board "show cause" order that would cut the Yamhill county metropolis from air passenger schedule.

By dictum of those directing the campaign, August will be known as "Air Travel Month" to every organized body within the city who during the drive, will concentrate efforts on boosting passenger traffic.

A dossier has been prepared pointing out the heavy Federal and city expenditures made in shaping up the airport for the growth which is expected to continue; strategic position of the McMinnville airport to Portland and other points to answer the CAB demand.

ADDED PHONE TARIFF

Patrons in Gresham are feeling the bite of an increased telephone rate.

Outlined in the OUTLOOK is the situation through which the telephone company promises an eventual toll-free setup for Portland and nearby communities at the expense of present telephone service charges. The new rate

schedule was effected last month.

The extended service promised with two or three years results in generally higher service rates but eliminates toll charges.

The enlarged phone bills at Gresham, a company spokesman declared, reflects a change in mileage steps upon which tolls are based. Formerly the first step was from 1 to 12 miles.

Now the basis is from 1 to 10 miles as a first step and 11 to 15 miles for the second. In effect, the new schedule moves Portland 15 cents further away, by phone.

FIR FROM SEEDS

As great oaks spring from little acorns, so the majestic Douglas fir grows from seeds found in its cones, is the lesson being offered at Vernonia.

According to the EAGLE, a call has been made for the collection of a large crop of fir cones, by the local tree farm office of a large lumber concern there.

Cones must pass selective grading before purchase, with a high price of \$1.25 per bushel going to those with 8 or more good seeds and 75 cents per bushel to those with 4 to 6 good seeds.

Cone quality may be determined by cutting it lengthwise and then counting the number of good seed so exposed. This year's crop is said to be excellent, much larger than last year and with average cones containing more than the usual number of seed.

DESTRUCTIVE URGE

The destructive urge that is believed to visit those with idle hands left its mark on the city park at Forest Grove.

The NEWS TIMES reports that teen-age vandals allegedly undid a lot of work in the recreation area when they tore loose bricks from the outdoor fireplace.

Not only were bricks broken from the front of the fireplace but the chimney was also cracked by the use of a lever. Several teen-age boys have been apprehended in connection with the outburst of vandalism.

Meanwhile, some of the local people who have donated time, effort or otherwise to the development of the park are said to wonder whether there's much percentage in trying to build up a playground and picnic area when vandalism "slaps it down."

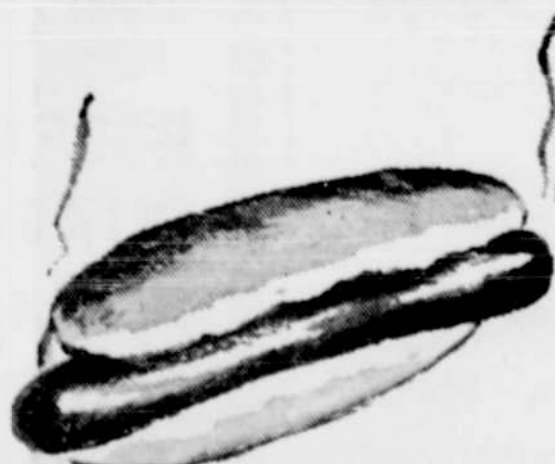
