Aroused Voters Besiege Council With Questions

A horde of aroused taxpayers and voters were present to make themselves heard, August 1, at the regular meeting of the Beaverton city council. Between 26 and 30 citizens crowded the chambers, with some stationing themselves just outside the door to escape some of the heat within.

Content to sit quiet for no more than thirty minutes the group became restive during the council's approving of its usual stack of bills. Contractor Paulson, who built some houses on Seventh and Eighth, in the vicinity of Tucker street, cast the first bombshell during the study of bills, asking the council members to speak up so the audience could hear what was going on.

The request was turned back with a gentle reminder that if the man would hold his horses a bit he would be given ample opportunity to sound off.

When called upon, Paulson identified himself as a property owner living in Portland who had lost some \$30,000 because of the slow city machinery in providing good streets and sewers. He stated he would like to know if there would ever actually be a sewer in operation for sanitary purposes and storm sewers as well.

This question led to a revival of discussion as to whether the city should put in stubs from the property line to sewer line, and the system to take care of storm run-offs.

A citizen with no name announced pounced to his feet to declare that "the people are getting fed up on promises and they want action." Others joined the hectic chorus, demanding installation of storm sewers before the onset of rainy weather.

The discussion wandered down many and varied byways. Barbed comments were made on the condition of streets and winter mud, with particular mention made on the long-pending improvements of Hall and 9th streets.

A rather heated exchange was carried on between one of the councilmen and a former resident of Los Angeles over the fact that the California city brings its water some 1100 miles or more and only charges \$1.50 per month while in Beaverton, where the water is normally close to the surface, water bills mount up to \$5.80 or better.

The impasse was finally resolved when one of the audience explained that he had seen a sign near Oregon City proclaiming "City Limits of Los Angeles" and that perhaps this is the sign of eventual lower water rates when the city limits reach here.

Another unnamed citizen, who is also a contractor, helped the meeting simmer down by saying he had lived in Beaverton some 43 years and he is "still waiting" for certain improvements. Patience, he pointed out, was the cure for most of the citizens' complaints.
