NEW BULLETIN EXPLAINS VETERAN BENEFITS

A new four-page folder explaining the World War II veterans' state educational aid program is off the press of the state printing department and is ready for distribution, the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs announced this week.

Preparation For Safer Vacations

Children and adults alike count on vacation time for relaxation, fun and the restoration of physical well-being after months of work or study. The secret of avoiding accidents and getting full enjoyment of vacation lies in a little common sense moderation and in being prepared for "summer emergencies."

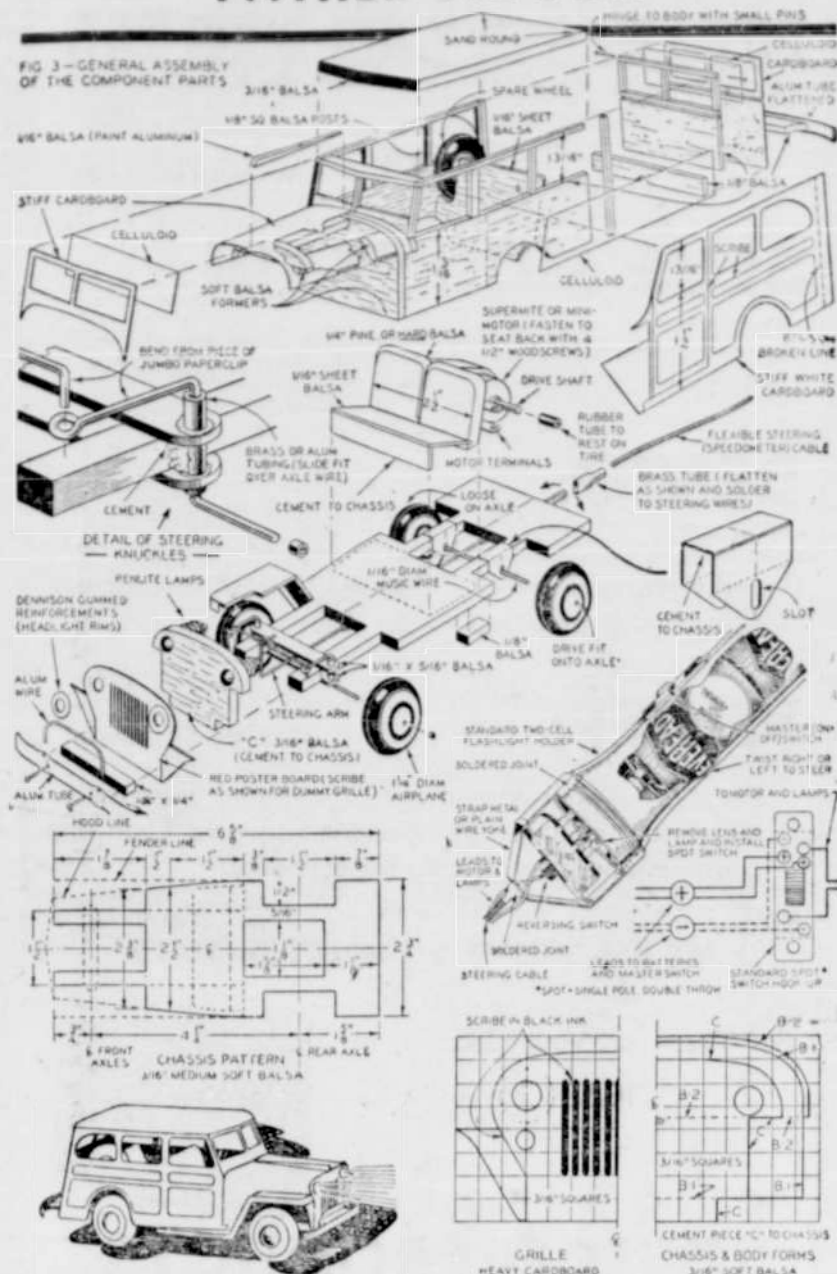
Many of us, after sedentary jobs all year, try to crowd strenuous physical sports into the short vacation period. Summer sports are fine, but we should not rush headlong into any sport. We should avoid over-indulgence until our bodies become accustomed to the unusual exercise.

Su tan should be acquired gradually. A safe rule is around five minutes exposure to the sun the first day, then longer sunbathing as the skin becomes less sensitive. Those who travel on vacation must be careful what they eat and drink. Fruits and raw vegetables should be carefully cleaned before eating. In unfamiliar territory it is essential to make certain of the purity of milk and water.

A knowledge of first aid is a valuable asset to anyone at any time. It is particularly helpful for vacation trips, and a small first aid kit might prove to be an important part of your vacation luggage.

A vacationer's knowledge of "what to do until the doctor comes" has frequently prevented serious complication and even saved lives, following accidents. Your family doctor or the local health department will give you instructions and literature on such things as artificial respiration for swimming mishaps, aiding victims of sunstroke, emergency treatment of snakebite, sunburn, or poison ivy.

BUILD THIS WILLYS-OVERLAND JEEP STATION WAGON

Dear Dad:

Junior probably isn't old enough to drive the family car but with your help he (and you) can have loads of fun "driving" this 7½ inch electric motor driven model patterned after the popular Jeep Station Wagon. It is powered with two Eveready No. 950 flashlight batteries housed in a regular flashlight case. You can steer this car remotely—make it turn to the right or left or even back up! Here's how it works. An ordinary 4 to 7 foot long automobile speedometer cable runs from the rear of the chassis to the battery case. Thus, by twisting the case to the left or right you can turn the wheels in the desired direction. Varnish insulated wire running from the Eveready batteries to the small electric motor which drives the rear wheels. Your local radio repair shop stocks the special switch and wire necessary for the control while your hobby shop carries the balsa wood, wheels and electric motor. You can build this car from these plans and instructions and you can

obtain additional information from the August issue of MECHANIC ILLUSTRATED magazine.

The car is made in two sections, the chassis and the body. Using the dimensions shown on the plan, cut the chassis from the prescribed balsa, mount the axle units and then install motor.

Note the speedometer cable, obtained from any car parts store, is permanently attached to the rear of the car. By twisting the cable the front wheels are made to turn in "the desired direction. The electric wires to feed the motor are taped to the outside of the speedometer cable.

After the wheels and steering mechanism are installed and the electric circuit tested, build up the body as indicated. Follow the plans carefully and you'll have a model that not only looks like the real Jeep Station Wagon but its just as rugged and easy to "drive".
