NOT APING TRUMAN

City officials were quick to disclaim any intention of aping President Truman, in the goings-on that saw a wood structure being built on the south side of the county courthouse, in St. Helens. The SENTINEL-MIST clears up the rumors that the county officials were putting up a balcony, similar to the much discussed and bootabout balcony on the White House in Washington, D.C. The county judge is the authority quoted to the effect that the structure was only a scaffold for workmen who had been assigned the task of cleaning the drains of debris that has accumulated over the years.

PRIVATE PRETZELS

Gresham finds its own private pretzel benders thriving for the simple reason that firms specializing in this companion to a frothy schooner couldn't supply them. A feature story in the OUT-LOOK tells of two men who, in 1945, thought the west coast should really know what a traditional pretzel was. They tried to contract for a carload of them but everywhere they turned to inquire, they received the same answer: pretzel factories had a hard time taking care of their own trade.

A pretzel recipe is never written and its formula is closely guarded by the family which controls it. So, instead of buying a recipe, it is necessary to hire a pretzel bender and baker.

These delicacies are not machine stamped but the artistic product of some baker's dough-bending. History of pretzels relate that they were first manufactured by monks, about 210 A.D., to give out as favors. The twist is supposed to represent folded arms and how the brittle mouthfuls ever became

popular with beer-quaffers remains a mystery.

Now pretzels are being promoted as teething rings or tidbits to eat with ice cream, salad, soup and milk. There are various kinds thin and dry, soft and up to 6 inches across, cheese flavored and "specials" for occasions not otherwise taken care of by the rest.

The soft pretzel, on the east coast, is sold by vendors on street corners, eaten with butter or mustard.

FULLTIME SCHEDULE

After two months of operation, McMinnville's radio station has been granted a fulltime schedule of program.

The TELEPHONE-REGISTER announces the Federal Communication Commission's decision to increase the period of broadcast from a present 12 hours per day to at least 16 and, if necessary, 24 hours per day.

The expansion of time necessitates a companion development of station facilities, the erection of an additional 210-foot tower and installation of phasing equipment for night-time directional transmission.

The station has been operating from sunup to sundown, with signoff about 9 p.m. during June gradually shrinking with the earlier retirement of Old Sol as winter creeps on. This, it is feared will cut in somewhat with plans for coverage of various sporting events.

Conversion of program production to the longer hours is set for about October 1.

EARTHWORM HULLABALOO

There's a lot of hullabaloo being raised in Hillsboro over a "giant earthworm" which is alleged to grow in Australia.

In the imperishable print of late, the ARGUS has been beat-

ing the drums for a contest to produce the largest and fattest angle worm in the county. A cash prize will be offered and in conjunction plans are being coned for a special race between the largest worms that turn up.

Key to the feature is an Australian earthworm which is reputed to be six feet long, with its body in proportionate size, and which is promised to be on exhibition at the county fair, August 31 through September 3.

The huge worm known officially as Megascobices Australis, are at home only in Australia and South Africa, the information solemnly asserts. They are said to be true to their class, burrowing to depths greater than six feet where they get a true earthworm's viewpoint on life.

They are captured at night, the account continues, when found feeding above ground. The natives make a flying tackle on the sausage-like critters and, quick as a flash, tie a half-hitch or two in their tails, to prevent them slithering back underground.

The reader is invited to imagine what consternation these worm rasslers feel, of course, when the normally six-foot long earthworm manipulates a few muscles and stretches to some 12 foot in length.

"G.I." Tuition Plan Requires 30 Days Before Operation

World War II veterans who plan to attend school or college under the G. I. Bill for the first time this fall have been advised by the Veterans Administration to start making their arrangements immediately.

Most institutions are expected to be as crowded as ever this year, the VA says, and unless early application is made veterans may find themselves unable to enroll.

Veterans also should apply to the VA for their Certificate of Eligibility at least 30 days ahead of time, in order to allow plenty of time for processing their applications and establishing their eligibility for training.

If veterans intend to apply for larger subsistence allowances for dependents, they should be prepared to submit the necessary documents at the proper time.

Veterans were also advised to come to school prepared to finance themselves for the first six or eight weeks of their course. Generally, first subsistence checks will be received by veteran-students after they have completed 30 days of training.
