Makes Sure FunMost people regard swimming
as the ideal summer sport. It is
good exercise and is refreshing,
and brings relief from summer
heat.So it is easy to forget that
swimming can be hazardous. We
may not realize the dangers of
swimming until we hear of a
drowning, or have the unpleasant
experience of a "narrow escape"
in the water ourselves.By far the greater percentage
of swimming fatalities are the
result of carelessness. In almost
all cases they could have been
avoided if a few precautions had
been observed.This may seem unnecessary ad-
vice, but anyone who likes the
water, whether it be lakes, pools,
rivers or the ocean, should learn
how to swim. Knowing how to
swim makes the water more fun,
as well as less hazardous.But even good and experienced
swimmers should never go swim-
ming alone. Accidents can happen
to the best swimmers and some-
one else should be along—prefer-
ably a person who also swims well
—to help out if anything should
go wrong.Most of us were warned as
small children not to go into the
water too soon after eating. Rush-
ing into the water before the food
has time to digest invites stomach
cramps which usually make their
victim helpless. People should stay
out of the water for at least two
hours after eating.Moderation is important in
swimming as it is in everything
else. No one, not even an expert,
should swim to the point of com-
plete exhaustion, or stay in the
water after he becomes chilled.
Panic, resulting in helplessness,
can overtake any swimmer who
becomes fatigued or chilled, al-
though most swimmers know that
when they become tired or cramp-
ed they should float on their
backs until they become rested or
until help comes.Widows of Vets
May Claim Soc.
Security MoneyWidows, children and dependent
parents of World War II veterans
who died within three years af-
ter honorable discharge were re-
minded this week by the Oregon
Department of Veterans' Affairs
that they may be eligible for so-
cial security benefits earned as
the result of the man's time in ac-
tive service.Title II of the social security
act provides that such veterans
are deemed to have died fully in-
sured, to have received monthly
wages of not less than \$180 and to
have been paid not less than \$200
in wages in each year in which
they had 30 days or more of ac-
tive service after Sept. 16, 1940,
under the act.The veteran must have had 90
days of continuous service, a
part of which must have been be-
tween Sept. 16, 1940, and July 25,1947, unless he was discharged
sooner for service incurred disab-
ilities.The effect of title II approved
in August, 1948, is to assure
monthly income payments to a
widow with minor children, or to
the dependent parents, or a lump
sum payment to the unmarried
widow without minor children,
surviving a World War II veter-
an discharged without dishonor
who died within three years after
his discharge.Payments are not made, how-
ever, where survivors are receiv-
ing death compensation from the
Veterans Administration because
of service connected death.Oregon officials of the social se-
curity administration said that
while the bulk of payments under
the act have been completed, due
to the fact that most World War
II servicemen were discharged
more than three years ago, there
are still some deaths occurring
among servicemen discharged lat-
er. Also, they said it is possible
some survivors have not filed be-
cause they were unaware of thesebenefits. Such applications are
still valid, they said, although
payments will be made retroactive
only three months from time of
application.

Applicants were advised to con-

tact their nearest social security
office, county veterans' service
officers, or the Portland or Sa-
lem offices of the Department of
