John B. Reynolds

Services for John Blackstone Reynolds who passed away on Aug. 9th at Hillsboro were held at the Pegg Chapel, Beaverton at 3 p. m. Friday August 12th. Interment was in Crescent Grove Cemetery, Elder R. J. Thomas officiated and Elder Armen Johnson sang at the service.

Mr. Reynolds was born March 11, 1879 in Columbus, Nebraska. For over thirty years he was prominent in the community of Hartshorne, Oklahoma where he operated a hardware business. His wife, Woody Banks Reynolds passed away in 1932 in that town.

Later, Mr. Reynolds sold out and retired. After some extensive travelling, he came to Oregon. He lived with the Frank Miller's for about ten years on McChesney Road, West Slope and assisted them as caretaker. Later he made his residence with Mr. and Mrs. Fred H. Mathis, 2939 S. W. McChesney Road, until the time of his death.

He leaves to survive him one son, M/Sgt James W. Reynolds with the U.S. Army at Warrenton, Virginia.

COACH PLANS NIGHT FOOTBALL SESSION

Because too many candidates for Beaverton's football team are working and thus unable to turn out for afternoon practice, coach Gene Freese announces that night sessions will be held August 25 and 26 of next week.
