ST. CECILIA CATHOLIC CHURCH FORMED IN CEDAR MILL, 1876

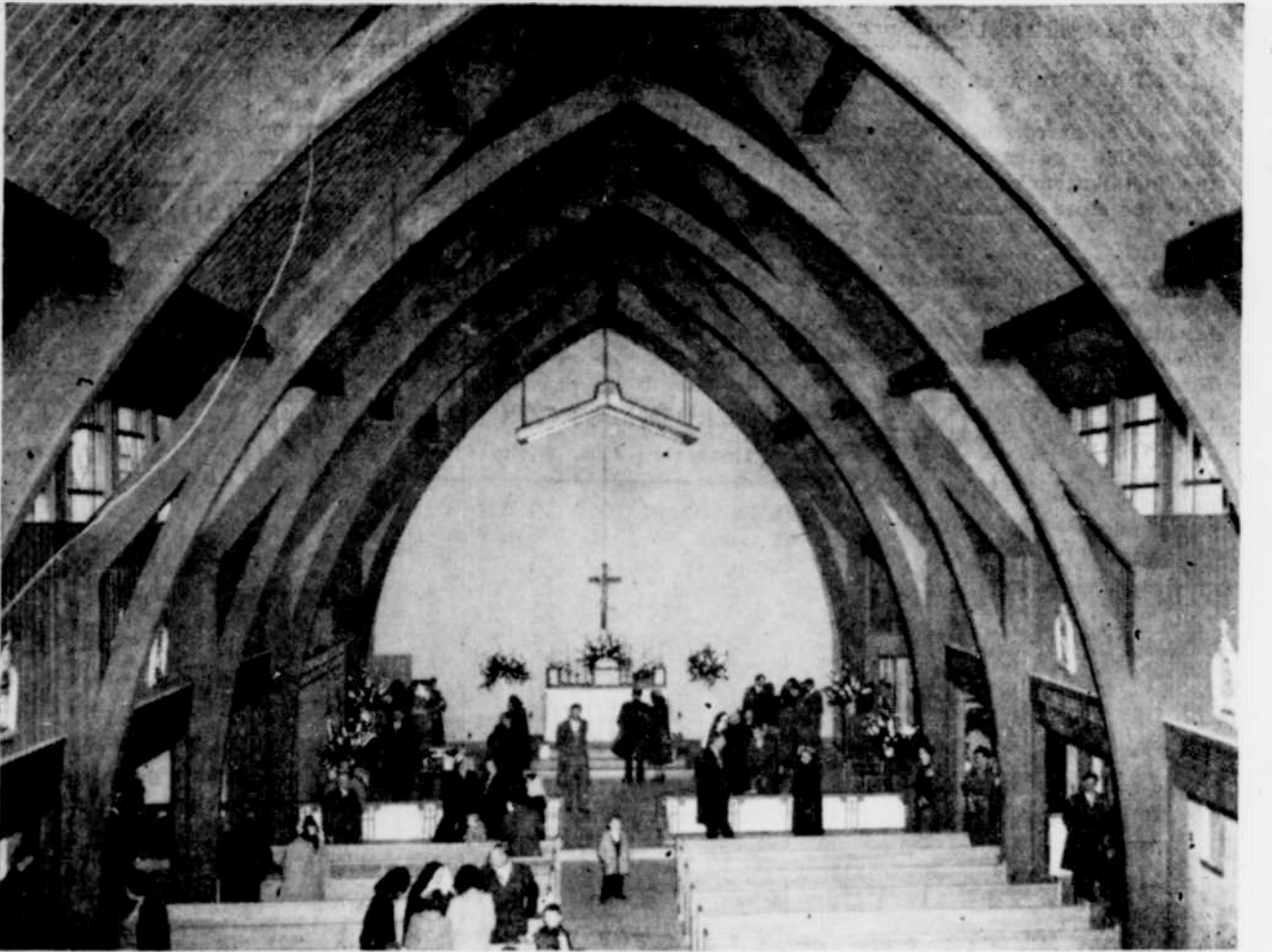
We are grateful to the foresight of the Rev. Jos. Ed. Hermann who took the time to keep notes of his service in the first Catholic church in Washington county. Only the old timers will remember when this first church was located in Cedar Mill and was known as St. Anthony's church. It was here in October of 1876 that His Grace, F. W. Blanchet, archbishop of Oregon City, appointed Father Hermann to attend to the Catholics of Washington county. He succeeded Rev. W. A. Verboort, who had died in July of that same year. Mass was said in different houses

Red Cross Sets Bloodmobile At M. Davies School

The October 24 visit of the mobile blood unit of the Red Cross to the Beaverton area will be headquartered in the Merle Davies grade school from the hours of 4 to 7:30 p. m., according to Mrs. Lee Thompson, Beaverton blood program chairman.

Mrs. A. C. Anderson, phone BEacon 3601 and Mrs. D. L. Hamilton, BEacon 0635, have been appointed to take charge of the West Slope area and prospective donors are invited to call either number for donor-scheduling and information.

Those intending to give blood to the program are asked to refrain from eating fatty foods for at least four hours prior to their appointments. Advised for lunch is a light meal of dry toast.

As it is impossible to schedule the bloodmobile in every community because of the expense, residents in Cedar Mill, Bonny Slope, Cedar Mill Park, Barnes School, Elmonica, Huber, Aloha, Hazeldale, Cooper Mountain, Progress, Raleigh, Westdale, Woodland Acres, West Slope and all areas adjacent, within the county, are invited to take part in the October 24 blood donation program.

The Red Cross, through county blood program chairman Mrs. O. C. Halvorson, wishes it fully known that no charge is made for blood itself which is issued from the 16 county cooperative blood bank of Western Oregon and Washington. The only charge made in a hospital is a service charge for cross-typing the donated blood and the patient. This is a protection to the patient and the cost falls far below the \$25 to \$60 usually charged per pint of blood from professional donors, in addition to the typing service charge.

High standards are maintained by the bloodmobile and staff. The unit is under direction of a qualified doctor and a corps of trained nurses. Each prospective donor receives tests to determine temperature, blood pressure, blood count as well as reporting his complete medical history.

Every precaution is taken to determine whether or not it is safe for an individual donor to give his pint of blood. Those whose condition warrant it are refused from making a donation.

All information concerning the blood program is kept confidential and any reason for rejection at the testing station is known only to the potential donor and the doctor.

es until John O'Brien offered an old block house for the divine service which was accepted.

Then in 1878 land was donated by Bernard McKenna and John O'Brien to erect a church. For want of means the church was not completed until 1882. To provide for the things required for the church an altar society was commenced in 1879.

The first baptism was James Shelvin who was born October 25, 1876 and baptized November 26, 1876 by Rev. Dominic Faber.

The first marriage was between Peter Mayer and Susan Duttonthal on February 13, 1877.

Then on August 2, 1908 this parish was moved to Beaverton and named St. Cecilia's. Again services were held in a temporary building until 1913 when the present school and rectory were built under the supervision of Rev. J. O'Flynn.

The first baptism in Beaverton was for Georgiana Malarky who was born January 17, 1908 and was baptized December 26, 1909.

The first marriage was Decatus Ford and Helen Ford on March 12, 1910.

As the parish grew the pastor found it necessary to have the

help and advice of his members and we see listed often the names of Mr. Holboke, Hendel, Smith and John Welch. Also Nick and Jake Kemmer, Mr. Kaufman and Joe Kluppenegger. While the men worked the ladies were not idle.

The record shows monthly cash donations raised by the ladies through various socials. One committee mentioned was: Mrs. Smith, Anna Hyland, Mrs. Liebrick, H. Kluppenegger, Mrs. Fitzpatrick. While serving this parish the

Rev. George O'Keefe saw the need for new and larger buildings to meet the need of our growing community. He purchased and donated the property where our new church now stands and where we hope to erect a school, and rectory very soon.

QUESTION: I am a very careful person and it seems to me that if I am watchful of the upkeep and repair of my property, it is very unlikely that an accident could occur which could be charged to my negligence. Why should I take on the needless expense of carrying a "Home Owner's Liability" insurance policy?

ANSWER: Certainly a person who is careful about the upkeep and repair of his property is much less likely to become liable for damages from an accident on that property. However, all your care may not keep someone from suing you for damages and even though you won the case, you might be forced to very great expense in just defending the suit. The proper insurance will not only handle your loss if the case goes against you but the insurance company will defend you in the suit itself.
