

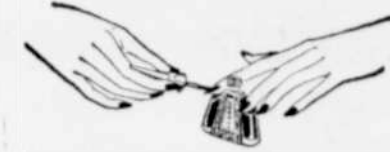
Young People of St Cecilia Sets Hallowe'en Dance

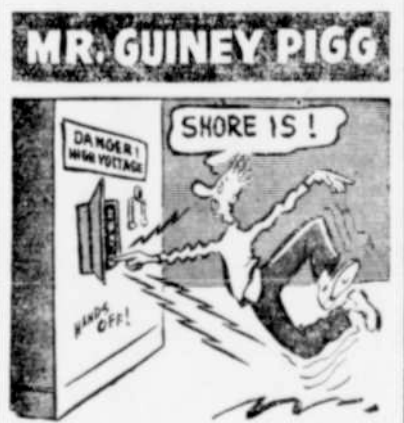

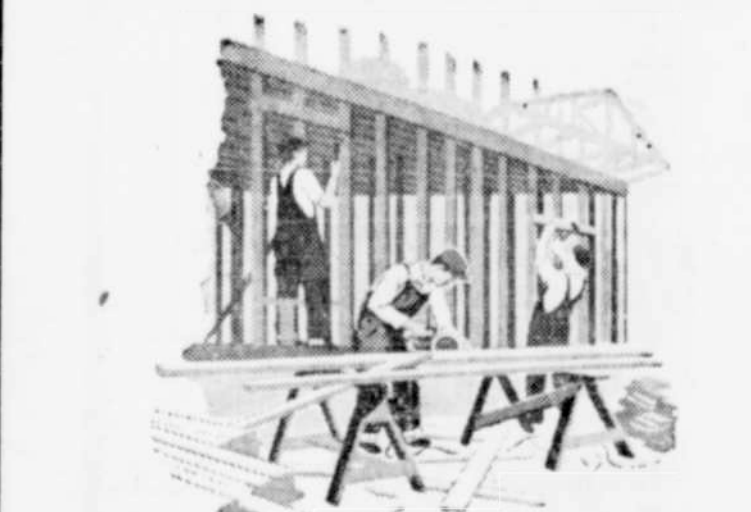

BOOST IN WATER RATE

In the name of progress, the city of Bend has been toying with the idea of installing water meters.

The PILOT relates how the five city commissioners had meters put to work in their homes for a comparative study.

At a flat rate plus the irrigation levy, water used would have totaled \$13.30. As metered, it actually added up to \$29.19. Flat rate average per home was \$2.66 but under the meter system, it jumped to \$5.55.

In this test case, the commissioners will remit on the basis of the flat fee and disregard the meter charge—according to an understanding reached when the sample run was decided.

During the test month, with the irrigation levy in force, charges were at the basic rate of \$2.35 per 500 cubic feet and 5 cents per 100 over the minimum.

HURRICANE BABY SIZE

A freak storm of hurricane velocity was a new marvel of Nature in the St. Helens area.

According to the SENTINEL, MIST, the big blow split trees and scattered debris and branches along the Columbia river highway.

Branches were also blown across the highway and caught by telephone wires. The storm's path seemed to be only a hundred feet wide and no property damage had been reported.

HONOR AS SMALLEST

With the trend in football teams leaning to getting the most players in uniform, Cove, Oregon gathers bits of notoriety in the manner of having the smallest high school football squad in the nation.

The whole thing started, says the EASTERN OREGON REVIEW, when the high school at Cherry Tree, Pennsylvania made a boast of their 21 man football squad as being the smallest in the state, which began a vigorous cross-country search.

At Cove high school, there are

14 boys in the entire school, 11 of whom are on the "first team" and one of whom acts as substitute. They lost their three games in September, but they won a letter of congratulations from Cherry Tree.

FANCY SAFE MOVERS

Clackamas county sheriff's had a real puzzler as an outgrowth of a safe-moving deal in Estacada.

The BANNER COURIER tells of a 1500 pound safe having been moved 30 feet across a linoleum floor without leaving a single mark in the soft floor covering, by parties unknown who were intent on cracking the strongbox.

The attempted burglary came to an unsuccessful end for the "crackers, who left before finishing their torch job of burning through the steel shell of the safe.

The safe contained valuable documents, all non-negotiable, but no money. There was a sign on it explaining that the strong-box was open, but this was disregarded.

APPRECIATES SAFETY

The Llewellyn PTA is not at all backward in showing appreciation to the school boy safety patrol and the importance of its work.

The SELLWOOD-MORELAND BEE details the news that the school organization voted to double the budgetary allotment to the safety patrol, during study and passage on the PTA budget.

PARKING LOT PROPOSED

Relief of a congestion problem is proposed at Vernonia by the Eagles lodge.

It seems, according to the EAGLE, the lodge bought a lot from the city for a new building site with the agreement that unless it was used for such a purpose, it must be sold back to the city.

Apparently the building is yet to be erected. In the meantime, it is urged to permit off-street parking—if enough funds might be obtained to finance the project.

WINTER RECREATION

In McMinnville, attention is again directed to the providing of recreation means during the winter season.

The TELEPHONE-REGISTER reports that October 15 will see the beginning of the program as formulated by the city recreational council. Appropriation of additional funds extends the winter schedule to even more children than last year.

Last winter, an average of 30 to 40 junior high school students participated in events. Children in the third to seventh grade, inclusive, also took part in organized games as provided.

The Teen Age club will continue this winter. A year ago, there were about 80 high school-age youth who were active in this program.

Needles 'n Pins And Tea Kettles Take 4H Honors

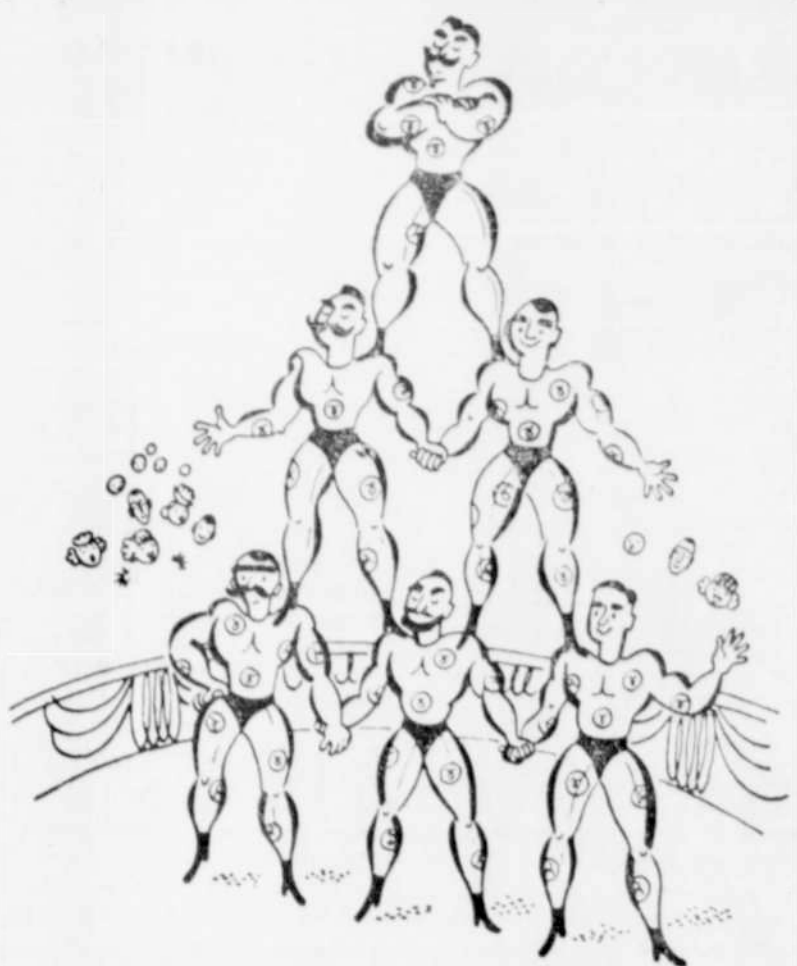
