School District 57 Joint Votes On School Site

Residents within school district 57 j., which takes in the former Barnes and the former Tualatin View grade schools, will vote on October 14 in the matter of acquiring a 2½ acre site for future construction of an upper grade school.

According to A. A. Ringe, president of the school board, the amount of money involved in the election is \$5,000. Although eventual plans call for obtaining 5 acres of ground, present vote is for the purchase of 2½ acres and the lease with option to buy, at \$100 per year, of the balance.

The school board recently conducted a public mass meeting at which the necessity for more classrooms was explained. After the meeting, date of the election was posted.

If this vote carries, a date will be set for a bond issue election which will ask for sufficient money to add classrooms and also expand present wash rooms at Barnes school.
