Dist. 57jt Votes For New Site By More Than 2 to 1

In the election held October 14 between 8 and 9 p. m., in the Barnes school on Walker road, taxpayers in school district 57 jt. voted by more than two to one their approval of a 5 acre site in Cedar Hills to be acquired for school house purposes. Two and a half acres will be purchased outright while the balance is to be leased with ultimate purchase in mind.

Tally for the purchase was 75 with 34 against.

November 2, 1949 is set as the date of another election on the issuance of \$90,500 in school bonds. To be held at Barnes school between 2 p. m. and 8 p. m., the election is to provide funds for purchase of site, for beginning construction of a school building thereon and to permit expansion of restroom facilities at the present Barnes school.

Purchase price of the land is \$2,000 per acre. For the first half, \$5,000 is to be paid and lease will be obtained for \$100 per annum.

Barnes school shows an increase in enrollment, this year, of 41 students, from 161 of last year to 202 this year. Part of this is accounted for by the consolidation of Barnes school district with Tualatin View district.

Archbishop Reads Rev. Mother's Requiem Mass

Reverend Mother Mary Genevieve, S.S.M., fifth Superior General of the Sisters of St. Mary of Oregon, died at St. Mary's of the Valley, October 17, as a result of a heart attack, an affliction from which she has been suffering for several years. Her death is a severe shock to her many friends and a distinct loss to her congregation.

Mother Mary Genevieve (Rose Vandervelden) was born February 17, 1883, at Verboort, Oregon, the fifth of the fourteen children of Mr. and Mrs. Adrian Vandervelden. As a daughter of one of the pioneer families in that Catholic settlement, Mother Mary Genevieve received her early education at Visitation School, Verboort, conducted by her congregation.

In 1902, Rose Vandervelden entered the Sisters of St. Mary of Oregon and received the name of Sister Mary Genevieve. During her religious life she gave devoted service to the Catholic schools in Sublimity, St. Louis, Verboort, Tillamook, St. Mary's Home, Beaverton, and St. Mary's of the Valley, Beaverton. Mother Mary Genevieve was elected Superior General of her congregation in 1937 while she was Superior of St. Stephen's School, Portland. It was her ever-increasing zeal, during the early years of her religious life that undermined her vitality and brought on the ill health which was her portion the greater part of her fruitful life.

Previous to becoming head of the Sisters of St. Mary of Oregon, Mother Mary Genevieve had been a member of the General Council of her congregation from 1925 to 1937, and was also General Director of Studies from 1928 to 1937.

Because of her naturally retiring disposition and delicate health, Mother Mary Genevieve went quietly about the work, effectively contributing to the cause of Catholic education in Oregon. She was ever solicitous that the Sisters of St. Mary be well prepared as teachers. During her administration a large number of Sisters received specialized training in state and out-of-state universities.

A real monument to the memory of Mother Mary Genevieve is the beautiful Romanesque Motherhouse of the congregation, located one mile west of Beaverton. It was Mother Genevieve herself who drew the first plans for this building.

In her immediate family, Mother Mary Genevieve is survived by a brother, William Vandervelden, and three sisters, Mrs. John Heesacker, Mrs. Julius Kindell and Mrs. Amos Lahaie, all of Verboort, Oregon. Three grandnieces, Sister Mary Edward Clare, Sister Mary Bernadette Ann, and Sister Mary Bernadine are also members of the Sisters of St. Mary.

Pontifical requiem mass will be offered at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, October 22nd at St. Mary's Chapel, with the most reverend E. D. Howard officiating. Interment will be in the Sisters of St. Mary Cemetery.

Accident Claims Crane Operator's Life, Sewer Job

Only death to date in connection with construction and installation of Beaverton's sanitary sewer system occurred October 15 at Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, when Glenn Bufton, 34, 6208 S. E. 128th avenue, Portland, died from injuries sustained when a heavy crane boom fell and crushed him October 13.

Bufton, a crane operator, was dismantling the boom of his crane preparatory to loading it on a semi-trailer. He reportedly hit the wrong pin and the 20 ton boom fell and smashed his leg in at least three places.

He had been an employee of the Hoodat Crane service, 1735 N. E. Union, Portland, for between 2 and 3 years. The mishap occurred on Cedar street, near the Beaverton airport.

Services will be held for Private first class William L. Van Kleek of Kinton, with interment at Crescent Grove Cemetery, as soon as the remains arrive, which is expected daily.

Private Van Kluk was born in Hillsboro, on Sept. 24th 1917. He enlisted in April 15, 1941 and was sent to Hamilton training field, left October 4, 1941 for the Philippines and was stationed at Clark Field.

He was reported missing after the surrender of Corrigador, and was wounded in action December 18, 1941.

No further word was received until the telegram arrived telling of his death of malaria on the island of Luzon, on July 23, 1942.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Emery Van Kluk, of Kinton and brother of Mrs. Perry Loster, Tigard and Mrs. Frank Heintz of Albany, Oregon.

Final Mains and Laterals Of Sanitary System Go In

BUILDER EXPECTS COMPLETION OF TREATMENT PLANT FACILITIES BEFORE END OF TWO WEEKS

Completion of major installations of Beaverton's sanitary sewer system within two weeks is expected by the two contractors who started the job about June 24.

Clarence Wilson, job superintendent of the Salem Sand and Gravel company, declares that the last of the sanitary sewer mains and laterals were to be put in Wednesday (yesterday), while Jack Brittan, of Jacobsen and Brittan, announces that only the loose ends remain for final installation of the sewage treatment plant.

Remaining for the Salem Sand and Gravel company to install is the specified storm sewer line on Lombard in addition to necessary street repairs. The last sanitary sewer lines were laid in the Hocken Acres subdivision, which the city added to the original plans upon request by property owners.

Under terms of the contract, Jacobsen and Brittan were allowed 125 days to finish their contract, from June 26, while Salem Sand and Gravel were granted 200 days from the same date. Unusually favorable weather has speeded up the longer contract by a good two months.

Completion of the main installations will now be subjected to rigorous tests and inspections under the direction of Carl Green, sanitary engineer, of Cunningham and Associates, before final acceptance and payment of the balance of the contract will be made to both contractors.

Next in order of the city of Beaverton will be the laying of stubs to connect the mains and laterals with individual property lines, following which will come the hookup of house and building sewers with the sanitary sewer system. Since no hookup is allowed before the sewer installation is accepted, use of the facilities must await the city's acceptance.

In line with the expected volume of connections to be made with the sewer lines, the city has passed a comprehensive plumbing code which plumbers and private individuals must follow under threat of penalty. Plumbers will be licensed in addition, at the paid-in-advance rate of \$25 per year and will be required to furnish a \$2500 bond.

Private individuals are not required to pay license fee nor furnish bond, although any installation so made must pass the city plumbing inspection fee, which a scheduled inspection fee is charged.
