Outlook Good for Duck Hunters Pacific Flyway

Congratulations are in order to the migratory waterfowl conservationists and to the sportsmen of the Pacific Flyway, who have done much to warrant the longest duck hunting season since the decrease of '47. Incidentally, the longest season and the greatest bag limit of all the flyways will be enjoyed by the Pacific Flyway this year.

The drought conditions in the Canadian provinces, the one serious setback, did not have a disastrous effect on the Pacific Flyway; so our Northwest Honker Stalkers are looking forward to October 21st and a winged victory.

Leo (The Lion) Laythe, Regional Director of the Fish and Wildlife Service, and Abbie Meyers, Federal Aid Coordinator of the Oregon State Game Commission, speak enthusiastically of the coming season, declaring that with a halfway break in the weather, the flight of birds should be much greater than last year.

Alaska and British Columbia, our main breeding grounds, have reported excellent breeding conditions.

Pin Tail production may fall a little short of last season's mark, but Mallards and Geese; especially Snow Geese, show encouraging increases.

It may be of interest to Western Oregon sportsmen to know that the Oregon Game Commission will have around sixty-two man blins available the first part of the season and seventy-five to one hundred for the second half in the Sauvies Island area.

Application blanks for these blins are available at the Game Commission and Agents. No application should be filed until October 7th or later. Any application filed before then won't count. It will be a first come first serve proposition, and the Game Commission has stated they are open to any other suggestion to determine blind assignments. The tariff is \$2.00 per person. Ouch, nicked again!

Yet what a pity that there is never enough wintering grounds to accommodate this great volume of migrating ducks. This is something for the Pacific Coast duck hunters to sink their teeth into and fight for adequate wintering habitat. The battle so far has been well spearheaded by the Western Game Commission, Fish and Wildlife Service, and Ducks Unlimited, so let's get in the fight also for wintering grounds.

Latest word is that the ducks are moving early this year — What causes this early migration? I'm sorry I don't know. Ask the birds!
