



## BEAVERTON AREA SETS PLANS FOR OCT. 24 BLOOD DONATION

Nearly 150 Beaverton residents are scheduled to make blood donations Monday afternoon, October 24, beginning at 4 p. m. and continuing until 7:15 p. m. at the Merle Davies Grade School. The Red Cross mobile unit is making its second visit to Beaverton this year as part of the drive to meet this community's portion of Washington county's quota to the 16 county cooperative blood program in Western Oregon and Washington, according to Mrs. O. C. Halvorson, county chairman for the blood program.

Doctor Paul McBride will be in charge of Red Cross nurses and technicians who will assist with the blood donations in Beaverton. A number of blood donors from Beaverton, West Slope, Aloha, Reedville areas have already signed pledge cards and the local recruitment committee under the direction of Mrs. L. Thompson, will continue to sign up potential donors.

Persons who wish to sign donation pledge cards may obtain them from: Mrs. A. C. Anderson, West Slope; Mrs. Dell Hamilton, West Slope; Mrs. Howard Trachsel, Mrs. Russell Grant, Beaverton; or Mr. and Mrs. Stubbs of Economy Grocery, Aloha, and at Reedville from Rev. Gilmore of Mrs. Paul Doyle, or from the personnel at the blood donation center at Merle Davies School on Monday.

Mrs. Thompson urges full cooperation by Beaverton area residents to meet the quota. She stated that these individual contributions are necessary to this important life saving program. The fact was stressed that this is a community program to meet the community's blood needs. To give in this program is to practice the Golden Rule, she said.

Afternoon hours have been set for donors at the bloodmobile because the time is more convenient for industrial employees and down town workers according to Mrs. Thompson. She said that not only have these people gone the required amount of hours without eating, but the time was convenient to them as they came off their jobs.

Mrs. Thompson said that it was not necessary for donors to change clothes. "In fact," she pointed out, "it is much better if persons come directly to the center as soon as they get off work."

The Red Cross blood collection program in Washington County has the endorsement of the county medical society, the county health department, the Jones Hospital of Hillsboro and the Forest Grove General Hospital. Dr. R. S. Welsh, two year member of the medical advisory committee, said that large amounts of Red Cross blood is used at the Hillsboro hospital and, at present, the county is a little short of its quota. He asked that the people of the Beaverton area do what they can to make up the deficiency.

Highest technical standards are maintained by bloodmobile technicians. The portable unit, to visit Beaverton Monday, is under the direction of a doctor and trained nurses. Each prospective donor receives tests to determine temperature, blood pressure, and blood content, at the same time he gives his complete medical history.

Red Cross officials report that every precaution is taken to determine whether it is safe for an individual donor to give a pint of blood. Persons who are not able to make donations will be refused. All information concerning the blood donation is confidential and any reason for rejection is known only to the potential donor and the doctor at the center.

### Supt. of Schools Tells Clerks of Pending Census

At an all day meeting held in the county court chambers, Hillsboro, October 14, Austin Scrafford, county superintendent, entertained clerks of school boards in the county at a session to instruct them on laws, budgets, census and related matters. About 50 school clerks, half of those in the county, attended.

Part of the morning was devoted to an explanation by Mr. Matich, office assistant of the public employee retirement system, followed by discussion on the retirement system, methods and policy.

For the balance of the morning session, Mr. Scrafford discussed school laws, general information for school boards, budget elections and the clerks' calendar for the year.

In the afternoon, Mrs. Amacher briefed the audience on preparation of clerk financial reports. This was followed by a question and answer period.

The boards will start taking school census on October 25.

### COUNTY ROAD DEPT. DRAFTS ROTOTILLER

According to county commissioner Jim Lewis, the road department has employed a rototiller-like device for preparing Blanton street, in the vicinity of the Aloha-Huber school for oiling. Jim says they have plans for a decent road there, again, after repair has been made of the winter damage.

### STRONG DRINK GIVES SETBACKS IN TIGARD

The fogs of John Barleycorn enveloped at least four citizens last week and gave them setbacks in Tigard.

Three women, on October 12, were reported from the 979 service station in a bad way from strong drink. Sheriff deputies responded to the alarm and saw the vehicle go completely off the road and cross over the yellow line twice in less than a mile.
