

All Star Grid Team Names One Beaverton, One Tigard

TYV COACHES HONOR TSUGAWA AT QUARTERBACK AND HUNT AT GUARD FOR '49 MYTHICAL ELEVEN

Tigard and Beaverton each place one player on the TYV Coaches-Hillsboro Argus all star football team for 1949, according to results obtained in a league-wide balloting as just released.

Jimmy Tsugawa, outstanding backfield star for Beaverton, received 3 votes for the position of quarterback, while Craig Hunt, stalwart of the Tigard line, earned four votes for the position of center. Hunt is a senior and Tsugawa is a junior.

In the special reserves, by reason of two votes each, Tigard placed Dick Fowler, of Tigard.

Honorable mention, by one vote each, was accorded Dick Stearns, Tigard, and Don Strandberg, of Beaverton.

Hillsboro, league champions, placed four in the all-star lineup; McMinnville won three places; Oregon City, Newberg and West Linn each topped one place apiece.

Judge Peters Sentences 2 To Terms In Penitentiary

CHECK CHARGE BRINGS MAXIMUM OF 5 YEARS WHILE EMBEZZLEMENT NETS NOT OVER THREE

In circuit court, at Hillsboro, December 2, Judge R. Frank Peters sentenced John Wesley Heard to

a term of not to exceed 5 years in the state penitentiary on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses and remanded Edward W. Kenney, former office man at McCall Oil company in Beaverton, to the penitentiary for a period not to exceed three years on a charge of embezzlement.

Heard was charged with having offered two \$10 checks to Rottman's Chevron station, in Beaverton, without arranging to open an account beforehand. Three other \$10 checks subsequently showed up against him. In addition, according to the district attorney's office, Marion, Multnomah and Tillamook counties have asked the man be held to answer charges there.

In his defense, Heard was represented as having made restitution on previous bad check escapades but that his trouble is liquor. He signified a desire to take "the cure" even if incarcerated and so get to the root of his trouble.

Judge Peters, noting the prisoner's past prison record which included forgery as well as check troubles, pointed out that one four-year stretch should have given him the opportunity to reform his habits.

Parole board report, requested at an earlier hearing of Kenney as a pre-sentence investigation, seemingly failed to convince the judge that he should show extreme leniency. However, he passed the decision on to the parole board.

Kenney's attorney pointed out that his client was under heavy
