## Kiwanis Speaker Urges Free Trade --Like It Or Not

Last Wednesday the Beaverton Kiwanis club heard an informative talk by Dr. John Berry of Pacific University, professor of sociology on conditions in England and what led up to the present state of affairs in the country.

Dr. Berry and born and reared in England and attended several universities in America. He has held positions in Europe, Canada and Labrador, all of which has given him a broad view and experience on international affairs.

The speaker was introduced by Dr. Frank McBride, program chairman, who arranged for his talk before the club. Dr. Berry told how the empire was built up in its early history and was slowly pinched off from her holdings abroad, through a wave of worldwide nationalism and subsequent tariff barriers which followed two world wars.

It is his belief that economic stability throughout the world will tie in free trade of nations—whether we like it or not. Some countries must export in order to survive. We must recognize this despite the fact, it would mean competition with our manufacturers.
