

Over Million Of New Taxes Spread In Co.

TREASURER LISTS
SEGREGATION MADE
FROM '49 - '50 ROLLS

Washington county treasurers office reports receiving segregation from the tax department in the amount of \$808,584.43 during the month of December.

This money has all been mailed during December to the following taxing districts:

Eight cities and city roads, \$41,334.89; 12 union & high schools, including rural levy, \$182,378.65; 68 district schools, including rural levy, \$348,835.45 and 7 water districts \$7,150.70.

The county general fund has received \$123,375.65; county road fund \$20,640.26 and 7 rural fire protection districts \$13,978.76.

The remainder is held to cover school district bonds and interest, and accounts of smaller tax levying districts.

County general fund warrants called for payment during December amounted to \$116,070.97, bringing the county on a cash basis.

The total segregated by the county tax department to date on the current 1949-1950 roll amounts to \$1,124,699.20, which has been paid to the various tax levying districts by the county treasurers' office.

Investigation of Tualatin River Irrigation Due

Nearly half of an approximate \$1 million allotted during the current fiscal year by the bureau of reclamation will be used for investigative work on Oregon irrigation and multiple purpose projects, according to announcement made by H. T. Nelson, regional director, at Boise, Idaho. All told, funds will be used in the study and survey of some 33 potential developments and for stream gauging of an additional 18 projects.

Of fifteen Oregon projects, the Tualatin River is one which will receive an allotment.

Hearing Jan. 9 To Discuss Lifting Of Rent Controls

LOCAL OPTION LEAVES RESTRICTIONS UP TO
CITY; BOTH SIDES INVITED TO PARTICIPATE

Whether all restrictions on rent will be done away with or a locally controlled measure will be instigated to examine and pass on requests for higher rents, will be decided January 9, when the Beaverton city council holds a hearing on the subject of rent controls. Both landlords and tenants are invited to be present and take part in the meeting, to help advise the council on action to be taken.

Various rental property owners of the city, on December 5, submitted a petition to the council calling for a hearing on the matter. As the plea pointed out, the council is empowered under present housing regulations to request abandonment of rental restrictions maintain them as they are or set up a local organization to examine such requests and recommend granting them or denying them.

After the hearing, if in favor of striking out controls, the council will prepare resolution for submission to Washington, D.C. by way of Governor McKay, calling for control-free status. Should it feel restrictions on rented properties deserve continuation, the council may retain present federal controls or set up a local board to handle the problem.

The property owners declare there is no shortage in rental accommodations, therefore no need for further controls. The petition also points out such expenses as increased taxes, sewer use charges fuel oil costs and others are out of proportion to the rentals that are allowed under the ceiling limitations. Repair and maintenance costs, it was also stated, do not allow property owners sufficient income to properly care for the property.

Those who asked for the wiping out of controls include S. E. Siddens, Helen G. Fisher, Mrs. Orselli, Mr. LaFond, C. E. Hunkapillar, Fred Goyt, C. Bryan Walker and Mrs. Anna Berthold.

Every opportunity will be given both landlords and tenants to present arguments for or against abandoning of controls, Mayor H. H. Jeffries announces. He adds that it is his understanding other major cities of the county have lifted rental restrictions.

Chevrolet For '50 Featured At Carr Showroom Sat.

At the Beaverton showrooms of Carr Chevrolet, all day Saturday, January 7, new 1950 models of the revolutionary Chevrolet will be available for public inspection. According to Guy Carr, it is expected that at least three passenger and one commercial model will be on display.

Most exciting development of the new line, Carr points out, is the automatic transmission "Powerglide" which is making a first appearance in the low-price field, as part of an optional extra-cost "power team" which includes a larger more powerful engine.

The Powerglide development makes use of hydraulic torque conversion whereby power is smoothly transmitted to wheels. Torque is the force of rotation generated at the engine crankshaft and now transferred through rapidly whirling oil to the rear wheels. No shifting action is necessary with Powerglide, regardless of required stop-and-go of normal traffic.

Companion development with the automatic transmission is provided with a new engine. Manifold was repositioned and hydraulic valve lifters installed. Axle ratio was reduced from 4:11 to 3:55, for lower engine speeds. The engine develops 105 horsepower at 3,600 revolutions per minute.
