Sheriff Relates Various Duties Office Entails



Sheriff "Doc" Busch, Beaverton Kiwanians had their guest speaker Sheriff R. E. Busch of Hillsboro at last Wednesday's weekly meeting. He was introduced by Thurlow Weed.

In 1932 when Busch took office he had two deputies. Today he has seven. The department is better equipped today including radio through which all departments can keep in touch with each other. Some of the duties of the office were related by Busch: law enforcement, tax collection and process serving. Preserving the peace entails headaches at times—the neighbors' chickens, the stray cow and family brawls were listed among these. Process serving is another detail involving considerable time and mileage.

Tax collection brought up a list of figures showing where the tax payers' dollar goes. Schools come up for the largest share. Schools are undergoing growing pains and will continue to do so for the next ten years.

Regarding a state controlled central police, which may come up for voters' approval, Busch pointed out to the club the pattern followed by Germany which arose in a government similar to ours. Under our present local police system a Sheriff can be recalled or voted out of office. A central police department can be a set-up in which privileges can be abused and heads not so readily removed from office. Harry Rothschild, who recently left the realm of bachelorhood to marry was given a song, "For He's A Jolly Good Fellow." The cigars were handed out amid congratulations and best wishes.

Wearers of fancy Christmas neckties came in for some attention. Fines were paid by wearers into a pot passed by Vic Lindberg at the suggestion of President Chet Huddleston. Fred Scheller wore the fanciest necktie. Sheriff Busch was fined "on general principles." He paid cheerfully.
