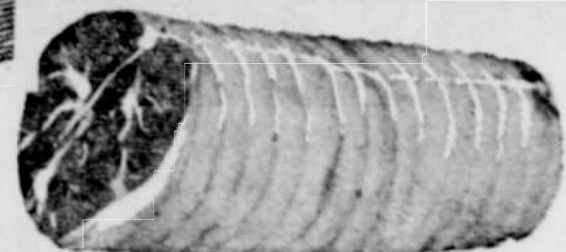

### Lewis and Clark Sunday Concerts Begin Jan. 22nd

LEWIS AND CLARK COLLEGE  
Portland, Jan. 19.—The first in a series of Sunday afternoon symphony concerts to run through the winter and spring season will feature three student soloists at 3 p. m. January 22 in the Campus theater.

In each concert the soloist will appear with full 65-piece symphony orchestra under the direction of Boris Sirpo.

The program, unique in music-training institutions, according to Dr. John Stark Evans, college music director, will give all advanced music students opportunity to perform in public under professional direction as soon as they meet standards but "without the frustration caused by competition with other students."

Sunday soloists will be Claire Hodgkins Walker, violinist, formerly soloist with the Portland Chamber orchestra, who will play the Paganini violin concerto; Marvin Nelson, trumpeter, who holds the first trumpet chair in the Portland Symphony, Haydn trumpet concerto; and Eugene King, piano, Shostakovich concerto.

The concert is open to the public.

### Clara Rockwell

Funeral services for Clara Maude Rockwell were held in the Pegg Chapel in Beaverton, Saturday, January 14, 1950.

Mrs. Rockwell, who had been in poor health for several years, died at her home near Beaverton, Oregon, January 12.

She was the first child of Robert and Ella Mason, born April 11, 1876, at Morrison, Ill. Following the death of her mother in 1881, the family moved to Rock Rapids, Iowa. Here she finished her high school education and grew to womanhood.

On March 12, 1902 she was married to Curtis E. Rockwell. To this union one son was born, Robert E. Rockwell of Los Angeles, California.

Mr. and Mrs. Rockwell started their married life on a homestead near Highmore, South Dakota. There they made their home for 32 years, moving to Custer in the Black Hills in 1934.

In 1943 they came to Oregon, locating on a farm near Hillsboro and have lived in this vicinity since that time.

Mrs. Rockwell was a member of the Methodist church. She was active in the Eastern Star and the P.E.O. for many years. She was a charter member of Chapter "T" of the P.E.O. at Highmore, South Dakota and organized Chapter A.W. at Custer, South Dakota, becoming its first president.

Besides her husband, C. E. Rockwell and a son Robert E. Rockwell of Los Angeles, Calif., she is survived by one grandson, Robert E. Rockwell, Jr., of Los Angeles, a sister, Mrs. Millie Aldrich, of Seaside, Oregon and a brother, Will H. Mason of Illinois.

### Former Illinois Veterans Collect About 1/2 Million

More than 1100 Illinois World War II veterans who migrated to Oregon after discharge from service have collected bonus payments from their native state amounting to nearly half a million dollars, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs disclosed this week.

A summary of out-of-state bonus payments by the Illinois Service Recognition board shows that 1187 veterans who left Illinois for Oregon had been paid a total of \$481,487, or an average of \$405 per veteran, up to June 30, 1949.

"This report, in a manner, indicates the trend in migration from one state to another as well as the transfer of monetary funds," according to John Downes, director of the Illinois bonus agency.

Altogether, bonus payments aggregating \$41,677,000 went to 100,806 Illinois veterans who migrated to 47 states, the District of Columbia and other countries. California received by far the greatest single number of in-migrants, 23,429, as against Indiana which was a second with 6,917.

The Illinois bonus may be applied for until June 30, 1951. It pays at the rate of \$10 for each month of domestic service and \$15 foreign duty, with \$50 the minimum payment and no top limit. The veteran must have been an Illinois resident at the time he entered service, and he must have served 60 days or more between September 16, 1940 and September 2, 1945. If he died of service connected causes between those dates, his next of kin is paid \$900.

Applications may be obtained in Oregon from county or veterans' post service officers, or the Department of Veterans' Affairs, 305 State Library Building, and 415 S. W. 11th, Portland.
