## Beaverton Plans To Have Police Attend Classes

The city council of Beaverton, meeting January 16 in the city hall, indicated enthusiastic interest in the police training classes to be conducted during the next three months under sponsorship of the Oregon Association of City Police Officers and the Oregon State Sheriffs' association. Plans are to have either "Skip" Weigle or Henry Mayfield, and maybe both of them, attend the classes.

This year's program supplements the basic training schools held last summer. The new series consists of nine special classes to be conducted by representatives of the FBI, state police and Portland police.

First four sessions will provide technical advice on such subjects as laboratory work in criminal investigations, interviews, preliminary crime investigation and traffic enforcement.

Last five classes will cover practical problems in the handling of burglary cases and will feature a simulated "on the scene" investigation, interrogation of "suspects" and a "court trial" of the accused.

Ten cities will hold schools, with Beaverton's officers slated to attend in Oregon City, whose starting date has been tentatively set ahead from January 17 to January 24.

## Plans of Future Keeps Her Young And Happy At 85

COOPER MOUNTAIN—Mrs. J. S. Buxton, who has lived in Washington county since 1873, celebrated her 85th birthday January 12 at an afternoon party given in her honor by Mrs. W. N. Keeler, a neighbor at Conner and Nora road, four miles southwest of Beaverton.

Mrs. Buxton explained the reason for her long and happy life as due to her always being busy and having plans for the future.

## Ballad Contest Final Quarters To Be Broadcast

FOREST GROVE. (Special)—Eight quartets reaching the finals in the fourth annual All-Northwest Barber Shop Ballad contest here February 24 and 25 will be heard by the entire nation.

The eight finalists will sing over a coast-to-coast hook-up of the National Broadcasting company, announces Ray Haas, general chairman. The broadcast will be aired directly from the auditorium stage through KGW, Portland, to the middle west and east coast, from 9:05 to 9:30 on Saturday evening, February 25. Due to a conflict, the show will be transcribed in Hollywood for release at 10:05 the same evening to Pacific Coast listeners.

This is the second straight year top quartets will go on the air nationwide. Last year finalists were heard over MBS.

The later release on the Pacific coast will mean the first show audience Saturday evening will be able to watch the actual broadcast, then hear it over their car or home radios after leaving the auditorium, Haas points out. First show featuring quartet finalists and a colorful Gay Nineties revue will begin at 7:30. The second show, at which winners will be announced, starts at 9:45.

Eliminations competition, at which all quarters entered this year may be seen and heard, will

be on Friday night, February 24, starting at 7:30.

During the two-day competition, Forest Grove will revert to the days of the Nineties. Everyone will be in costume. Buggies, horseless carriages and bicycles-for-two will be on the streets.
