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Applications or WN. State Bonus Co. Courthouse

Application forms for the Washington state World War II veterans' bonus are available at state and county agencies and service organizations throughout Oregon. The state Department of Veterans Affairs announced from Salem this week.

The Oregon veterans' department has received a supply of the forms and has distributed them to county veterans' service officers in 22 counties. The county service officer for this area is Fred Corn, located at the Courthouse in Hillsboro.

Forms also may be obtained direct from the Department of Veterans Affairs at 305 State Library Building, Salem, and 415 S. W. 11th Avenue, Portland, and from headquarters and local posts of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the

Disabled American Veterans.

Applications can be obtained through the mail by writing the State Auditor, Bonus Division, Olympia, Washington.

To be eligible, veterans must have resided in Washington for at least one year prior to entering the armed forces. Service must have been between Dec. 7, 1941, and Sept. 2, 1945. The bonus pays \$10 for each month of domestic service and \$15 for each month of foreign duty. Top payment possible under the act is \$675.

The act provides that unmarried widows, children or dependent parents of Washington men who died in service may receive the amount of benefits such veterans earned up to the time of their death.

A singular requirement of the act is that the application blank must contain a sworn statement by one witness that he knows the applicant meets the Washington residence requirement.

Actual payments, according to Washington bonus officials, probably will not start until after March 1.
