Provides that every person and
managing agent or officer of any
firm or corporation or association,
owning or having possession of or
control of taxable personal prop-
erty, shall make a return thereof
to the county assessor of the coun-
ty in which such property is lo-
cated on January 1st, 1950. The
final date for filing this return is
March 2nd, 1950. In 1949 this Law
was Amended making it manda-
tory that the assessor add the pen-
alty of 5% to the tax on all re-
turns that are filed after the said
March 2nd, 1950.

RED CROSS HAS RECORD NUMBER SERVING U. S. MILITARY FORCES

With U. S. military forces at five
times their prewar strength, a
record number of American Red
Cross workers are serving them
throughout the world.

More than 2,000 Red Cross rep-
resentatives today are stationed at
1,300 military installations and 123
hospitals here and overseas. About
1,400 staff workers are serving
troops in this country. The others
are working at occupation and de-
fense posts abroad. Only during
the peak years of World War II
were a larger number on duty.

The duties of these Red Cross
workers are as varied as the locale
in which they work, involving a
wide range of welfare services that
contribute to military morale. They
may include tiding over a soldier's
wife with grocery and rent money
until her family allowance check
comes through, or getting a wel-
fare report on an Eskimo service-
man's mother via weather bureau
radio. Sometimes it means getting
word of a family emergency to a
sailor with the fleet in the
Mediterranean.

Service of the Red Cross worker
in a military hospital may be help-
ing a man through the difficult
hour when he learns that he will
never be well again or removing
the worry that often stands in the
way of his recovery.

Under federal statute and
regulations of the Army, the
Navy, and the Air Force, the
American Red Cross furnishes
volunteer aid to the sick and
wounded of the armed forces
and acts in matters of voluntary
relief and as a medium of com-
munication between the people
of the United States and their
armed forces.

In the last year Red Cross staff
members handled more than 102-
000 welfare cases in military hos-
pitals. More than 500 professional
Red Cross workers are stationed at
40 army hospitals, 26 navy hos-
pitals, and 14 air force hospitals.

For the able-bodied, too, what-
ever the problem or wherever the
serviceman is stationed, the chances

are that the Red Cross has a field
worker on the spot or nearby who
can help try to solve it.

In this country 361 field direc-
tors and their assistants cover 148
base stations, 31 substations, and
923 itinerant stations. During the
last year field directors at camps
handled more than 672,000 cases.

Health and welfare reports re-
quested by servicemen or their
families were the most common
type of help asked for. More than
179,000 such cases were recorded.
The next most frequent type of re-
quest was that involving leave or
extension of leave. The Red Cross
cannot grant leave, but military
authorities depend upon the or-
ganization for reports of conditions
underlying leave requests. These
cases run into many thousands
each year.

Abroad, Red Cross coverage is
almost as complete as in this coun-
try. In Japan alone, 159 men and
women are serving occupation
troops at 81 military installations
and 14 hospitals. Other parts of
the Far East are equally well
staffed.

In Europe, 248 Red Cross work-
ers serve military personnel and
their dependents at 51 military in-
stallations and 15 hospitals, most
of them in occupied Germany. Cov-
erage is also given in England and
France.

Home Furniture Repair Project Saves Farmers

The statewide home furnishings
program has resulted in substantial
savings to farm families, according
to Mrs. Myrtle Carter, OSC exten-
sion home furnishings specialist,
who reports that women participat-
ing in the project estimated their
savings at \$12,877 last year.

The sum represents the difference
between cost of articles con-
structed or renovated and the
value of professionally built or
repaired items, the specialist ex-
plains.

Instruction in home furnishing
has been in demand during the
past year because of the high cost
of new furnishings. Workshops
were carried out in slip covering,
upholstery, furniture refinishing,
rug making, and related subjects.
Individuals worked through their
local county home extension units.

A total of 114 training meetings
were conducted in this phase of
the extension program. Five-hun-
dred and sixty project leaders were
trained. Number of workshops con-
ducted totalled 104 and 77 of these
were in the charge of project lead-
ers, Mrs. Carter says in her report
of the year's work.

Representing approximately 11-
000 home economics extension unit
members, 459 groups were enrolled
in home furnishings projects. More
than 22,921 persons indicated they
were assisted by various methods
shown in this phase of the home
economics extension program.

Mrs. Carter, local county exten-
sion agents in home economics, or
trained leaders upholstered 390
chairs, 54 davenport, repaired 54
pieces of furniture, slip covered 46
chairs, refinished 37 pieces of old
furniture and finished 197 new
pieces. One-hundred and forty-sev-
en hooked, and 151 braided rugs
were also made.
