immediate treatment by Dr. Vernon Hanson. His right leg was broken above the ankle and he was removed to Jones hospital, in Hillsboro, where metal pins were inserted.

Fourteen boys took in the outing, supervised by Jack Mutchler, scoutmaster; Lyle Skeels, assistant scoutmaster; L. W. Kingsley and Mr. Uppinghouse, scout committeemen, and Jack Miner and Clifford Martin, cubmasters.

Dr. Hanson, Uppinghouse's brother-in-law, stayed in Cedar Mill Sunday night and could report quite a "fight" in getting through the drifts to his clinic in Beaverton.
