

## Noted In File Of County Sheriff

### THE MEAT CAME BACK

Charlie Stubbs, co-owner of the Economy Market in Aloha, Jan. 25, wound up with a bum check for \$30, tendered in payment for \$1.25. But the meat, at least, came back.

A customer ordered the package of meat between 7:30 and 8 p. m. Jan. 24, offering a check drawn on the Uptown First National Bank, allegedly made out to him and signed by his mother. When there was a question about the check, the man rather indignantly said it was his mother's issue and that they both lived at the same address, which he gave by presentation of a selective service registration card.

Next morning, L. H. Farlow, of Aloha Pharmacy, came into the market with a package of meat like that purchased by the check in question. The suspect had purchased drug items and left his meat.

This set a chain of events into motion which resulted in the disquieting information that the check was a phoney, like the address given.

### HIGH SCHOOL GANG

Certain boys and girls of high school age, allegedly running around in a gang at Tigard, are considered most likely suspects by Mrs. W. J. Scott, who reports larceny from the dwelling of her mother, Mrs. Josephine Meyers, Route 1, Box 183, Tigard, between 6 and 7:30 p. m., January 19.

Mrs. Meyers had been on the coast for a visit. Her daughter, on the day noted, saw lights in the house. Investigating, Mrs. Scott noticed two suspects running from the house. Their tracks led to Bend road.

A shotgun was fired over the heads of the culprits. But this seemed to speed them, rather than slow them down.

Known to be missing are an electric waffle iron, electric iron and dark-colored suitcase. All drawers were ransacked and bedding mussed up.

Full report of missing articles must await return of Mrs. Meyers.

Wayne Faulconer, of Sheridan, Oregon, proved to be a fast businessman by events that concluded last week. But he may have three years to think it over.

About the 6th of last April, he purchased a restaurant from Philip Landauer, at Sherwood, with a stretchy check for \$1800, drawn on a Gresham bank. On the basis of owning a restaurant, he set about passing additional checks for about \$200 and left, taking with him a radio and mix-master from the restaurant.

Three days later, in Forest Grove, he purchased a \$300 wedding ring set with another bum check.

## Portland Museum Shows Paintings Bound Overseas

An exhibition of paintings by twenty living American artists will be assembled in Portland in March to be shown in the American, British and French sectors of Germany as a part of the reorientation program for Germany of the U. S. High Commissioner. The exhibition which will be the first American show to reach Germany since the war, originated at the request of Dr. H. F. Peters, head of the American Institute of the University of Munich, to Dr. R. F. Arragon, former president of the Portland Art Museum, for an exhibition to be shown at the formal opening of the institute in May, following which showing it will be exhibited as a HICOG sponsored project elsewhere in Germany.

The assembling of the exhibition was undertaken by Thomas C. Colt, Jr., director of the Portland Art Museum, where the exhibition will be shown beginning March 24, prior to shipment to Germany. A letter Mr. Colt received today from the United States department of state welcomed his initiative in the project and gave assurance of the department's assistance in the exchange of the exhibit.

## 1950-51 BUDGET POLICIES FOR WASHINGTON COUNTY RURAL SCHOOL DISTRICT BOARD

I. TEACHERS SALARIES: Consider one, two, or three-room school teachers on individual basis to attract best qualified. Limit elementary teachers to \$3,000, accepting salary schedules for school year 1949-50 for guidance.

For elementary principals, conform generally to the following schedule: 4 classroom units, \$3300 with \$100 more for each additional classroom unit up to and including 10. From 11 to 20 classrooms, add \$50 per additional unit. Examples: 5 classrooms, \$3400; 11 classrooms, \$3850; 15 classrooms, \$4,150; 20 classrooms, \$4400.

Base high school salaries on budgets of local district for 1949-50. Local board in all cases determines individual teacher salaries. Rural Board merely approves total budget item, "Instruction", and amount it would contribute county-wide toward salaries.

Local boards in four-room-and-above districts should set their own salary schedules, based on training and experience.

II. EMERGENCY FUND: Amendment by 1949 legislature permits Rural Board to levy 5 per cent over and above local district emergency fund. With local average of near 5 per cent for this purpose, the total would be nearly 10 per cent of total budgets to aid districts wherein an emergency arises that was "unforeseen at the time the estimate was adopted."

III. TAXES NOT TO BE COLLECTED: Taxes estimated not to be collected during the fiscal year for which budget is made should amount to 10 per cent of the budget.

IV. PREVIOUS POLICIES: Above items may be considered as new or amended policies. Policies that have been adopted previously by the board and not altered are considered to be still in effect.

V. EXPLANATIONS: Attach to the budget estimate filed with the Rural Board an explanation of amount allowed under each item in order to speed approval. Explain in detail such items as "Maintenance and Repair"; "Auxiliary Agencies"; "Capital Outlays" and "Operation of Plant". List janitors, bus drivers and employees other than teachers, stating duties as briefly as possible.

### CALENDAR

BUDGETS should be posted or published by February 20.

DEADLINE DATE for delivering district budget to Rural Board is March 15.
