Light Snowfall Greater Danger Than Blizzards

Light or moderate snowfalls can be even more dangerous to motorists than a full-fledged blizzard, the state traffic safety division advises drivers, in comment on the state's unusual barrage of snow and cold weather.

Officials pointed out that when blizzard conditions develop, drivers are concerned with their safety and stay off the highway if possible. But a light snow is deceiving. Many drivers fail to realize that while a heavy fall of snow may be hard to get through, the real skidding danger is found on hard-packed snow or underlying ice.

Winter driving tests conducted on ice-covered Pine Lake, Wisconsin, have shown that tires with good treads are no more effective than smooth tires on packed snow or firm ice. Tire chains, however, will reduce stopping distances 40 to 50 percent, providing a margin which frequently means the difference between safety and accident.
