SNOW COSTS COUNTY ESTIMATED \$40,000

According to H. D. Kerkman, county judge, the cost of the winter's snow has already amounted to an estimated \$40,000. This gives support to the contention that the month of January, 1950, was the worst winter ever experienced in Washington county.

County equipment and crews used to keep roads clear included 8 maintainers, two caterpillars and 3 snow plows. In addition six or seven private cars were hired to fight a continuing fight against isolation of families and communities.

Few families were known to have been snowbound, although drifts raised particular hob with many. The primary effort of the county was directed in trying to reach areas that were snowed in. Kerkman points out that some of the roads in the foothills had drifts up to 7 feet. All roads have not been cleared but some means of traffic, had been provided by county crews.

UNDER TREATMENT

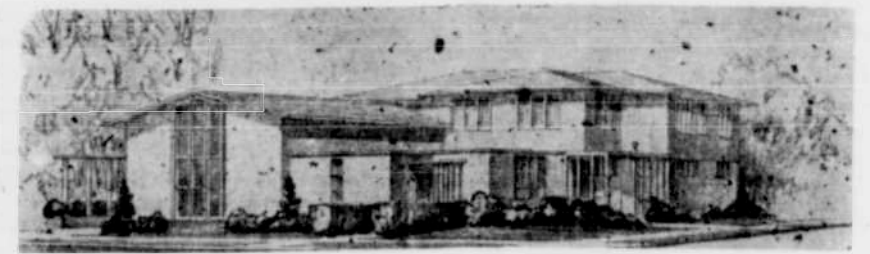
