WEST SLOPE—The official opening of the Dr. Ruben Rutten dental office in the new clinic building off Cashmum Lane, was held Feb. 1, and attracted a throng of interested visitors who viewed the new quarters and took the occasion to become acquainted with the doctor and his wife, who is assisting him in his new venture.

The office is in the same location as the Dr. K. P. Caveny office, though the two offices are separated by a patio in the modernistic building which was finished and opened last summer.

Dr. Rutten received his early training in North Dakota and graduated from the Northwestern University in Chicago. Following graduation he engaged in practice in Langdon, North Dakota where he and Dr. Caveny were friends and associates. After 25 years in Langdon he decided to seek new fields and Oregon became his choice, finally settling down to West Slope where he plans to make his permanent home.

Dr. and Mrs. Rutten completed architectural designs with their own ideas in arrangement and furnishings. The result is a convenient, well-equipped set-up, with specially designed furnishings in white birch.

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HUNTING & FISHING Around

Wonder when the spring run of Salmon will be in this year? Last spring the "Chinook" was being caught in the mouth of the Clackamas River as early as the first week of March. A short time later catches were reported at the mouth of the Willamette and shortly after around the Oregon City falls area.

Trotting is by far the most popular form of angling for the "Spring Royal." If you are waiting for news of that first kill better check your boat and motor now. Break out your salmon gear and be ready to go. Who knows, the run may be earlier this year.

If you've had any trouble with your line twisting lately here is a little info that may be of some value to you: Remove the lure and weight and let the line drift down stream in the current for the distance of a normal cast. Retrieve the line slowly simultaneously raising and lowering the rod tip. If all the twist isn't out repeat the process. This may sound like a lot of bother but it pays off in avoiding snarled lines and preventing coils from forming and catching in the guides.

Jim Peterson, West Slope, Oregon reports the Nehalem (near tide water) paying off last week and Jim got his "Steelies" very handily. "Nice going Pete."

Jim Hanson, Beaverton, got a few on the Trask last Saturday

and reports of good catches on the Toutle and Tillamook have been received. A special word of praise for a hardy brand of anglers braving the winter's icy blasts for a whack at "Steelie" sport.

Seems like a lot of fishermen these days, especially the old-timers, who declare that winter steelhead can't be taken on anything but cluster eggs and believing this they do very well on them. A short while ago, while fishing a familiar steelhead pool on the Trask we were admonished for using spinners by a veteran steelie fisherman who lived close by. "I've seen only 2 steelhead caught in this pool in the last 50 years on spinners," we were told. Total catch for the day: Four, taken on 1/0 and 2/0 Colorado's. Oh well—"To Each His Own".....

Testing various brands of leader the other day we were surprised to find a four pound test leader failing to break at seven pound pressure. We measured the diameter of quite a few brands and although they were all of the same test—none of them were of alike calibre. Testing monofilament casting line a similar condition was found. This makes for a confusing situation when trying to balance leader and line. Calling a spade a spade might solve this problem and American line and leader manufacturers might take a tip from the makers of French mono on this point.

In our wanderings around the Ramsey Lake and adjoining sloughs last Sunday we noticed a lot of quackers on the wing. No dead ducks in this area although there were reports of dead and starving waterfowl elsewhere.

Got closer to a flock of honkers than at any time during the open season. "They'll do it every time."
