Dairyman Tells Raw Milk Story To Kiwanis Club

Beaverton Kiwanians had a meeting filled with variety last Wednesday. Bill Grauer, program chairman for the month of February, had planned to present a speaker who was unable to attend at the last moment.

As master of the situation, Grauer called upon two guests and a member for impromptu talks. P. Beryl Morris, Beaverton Boy Scout Field Executive, gave some statistics on scouting in this area.

He said there are 15,000 boys in the program in the Portland Area Council, with 140 of these in Beaverton. He introduced Milton Drake, Scoutmaster of Troop 208, sponsored by the Beaverton Kiwanis Club. Drake filled the post held for several years by Crandall Peck, who is now residing in Junction City. The growing interest in Scouting is expected to necessitate the formation of another troop.

Major F. P. Stevens of the Salvation Army, a Portland Kiwanian, gave a talk on the work his organization is doing. He explained that the Salvation Army, organized 84 years ago by William Booth, then a lad of 15, serves 97 countries and colonies with disaster relief, music and religious teaching.

They have welfare boards at Hillsboro and Forest Grove in Washington County and stand ready for call at any time in case of emergency. He told of the work done by the Army during the Vancouver flood, \$39,500 cash and tons of food and clothing went to that disaster alone.

The third speaker was Fred Scheller, Beaverton Kiwanian of the Aloha Dairy gave a talk on the controversial raw milk control issue. He stated that Oregon has the strictest milk regulation in the United States.

One cow dairies were held to be suppliers of milk which is not as safe as that from larger dairies because their animals are not tested. The trend is toward pasteurization, although this product is not as vitamin rich as raw milk. The two sides of the issue seem to be the Portland Health Department and the small producers.

Ad George, musical chairman, introduced David Carl, who played two violin solos: "The Magic Horse" by Suter and "The Happy Farmer" by Schumann. He was accompanied by his instructor, Ruthann McKenzie, violin teacher for the Beaverton grade school. The little fellow shows real talent and his performance was enjoyed by the club.
