Dear Mary Grace: My young son is recuperating from an illness and must now gain weight — but food has lost its appeal for him. Do you have a special recipe that would intrigue and help him gain weight simultaneously? Thank you, Mrs. J.

Dear Mrs. J. Luckily the period of convalescence for children, at least, is brief at best, so it won't be long before his interest in food will pick up. In the meantime here is a recipe for a dessert that is tasty, interesting and a weight gainer as well as a blood builder. The whole family will like these FRUITY BARS:

Ingredients for 9 bars: 1/2 cup dates pitted, 1/2 cup nuts shelled, 1/2 cup figs dried, 1/2 cup raisins, 2 tbsps. sugar, 4 squares (ozs.) unsweetened chocolate, 1/2 cup molasses. Method: Combine molasses, sugar and chocolate in top of dbl boiler, set over hot water in bottom part of dbl boiler. Cook until chocolate melts. Have baking pan ready with some sugar sprinkled on bottom. When chocolate is melted add chopped fruit and nuts gradually. Mix well. Pour into pan, spread evenly. Let stand 2 or 3 hours before cutting into squares. Did you know that the use of too much salt in the daily diet may cause wrinkles?

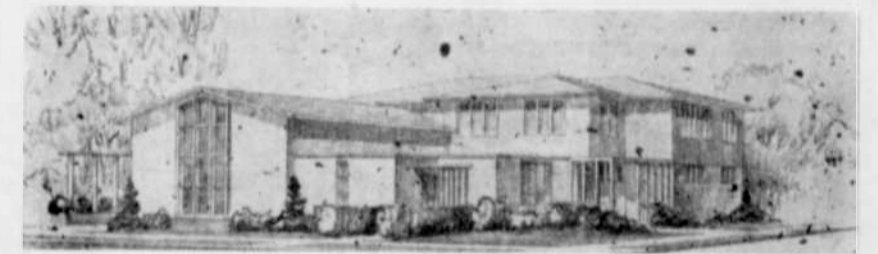
