College Speakers Address Seniors

Representatives from the various state institutions of higher learning addressed the senior class Thursday morning, stressing the importance of going to college.

Faculty members from Vanport, Oregon State, University of Oregon, Oregon Tech, and the Oregon Colleges of Education pointed out the advantages for better education in attending their respective schools.

Dr. Philip Putnam, assistant director at Vanport, stressed the need of having a college education in order to compete with the great number of veterans now located in jobs. He also added that the cost of attending a state college is considerably less than a private institution as "the state matches your dollar with 2 or 3 of their own."

Dr. Robert L. Smith, supervisor of student personnel at the newest state school, Oregon Technical Institute near Klamath Falls, went on to say that all classrooms at the college are set up to resemble actual working conditions and that complete recreational facilities are available to the students.

Miss Betty Mann, representing the University of Oregon Medical School, declared that nurses are critically needed. Training and experience will be available to anyone taking nursing at several large hospitals. She also pointed out that opportunities for jobs are open for nurses everywhere.

The old-fashioned idea that a convertible and lots of money will help in getting through college is often misleading to students. In fact, it was asserted that one would be a lot better off "if he enters school with just a small amount of money."

Mrs. Golda Wickham, associate director of student affairs at University of Oregon, concluded with "regardless of what course you're going into, there is a school that will help you."

After the meeting, students were invited to inquire about anything that they might be in doubt about concerning campus life.

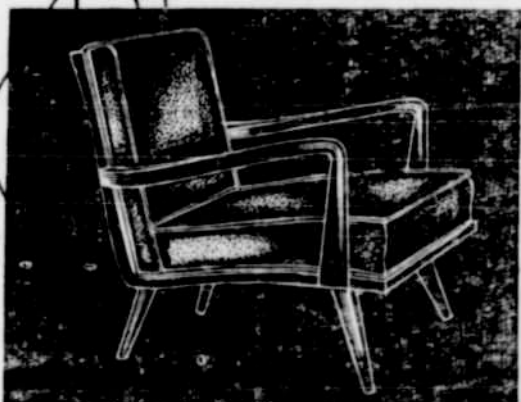
