Herbert Jackson

Requiem mass was offered for Herbert Paul Jackson, veteran of World War II, at St. Cecilia Catholic Church, Beaverton, on Tuesday, Feb. 28th at 9:30 a. m. The Rev. G. M. Sniderhorn officiated. Vault interment was in Crescent Grove Cemetery.

Mr. Jackson, age 24, passed away in the Veterans hospital, Portland, on February 24th after an extended illness. Recitation of the rosary was at the Pegg Chapel, Beaverton, on Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

Herbert Jackson was born on September 28, 1925 in Lincoln, Nebraska. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Jackson of Omaha. He graduated from Technical High School in Omaha and was active in Boy Scouting and he worked up to assistant troop leader in Scout Troop No. 29. He enlisted in the Navy at Omaha on September 24, 1943 and served in the American area and the Asiatic Pacific receiving the Victory Medal and Good Conduct Medal. He was discharged at San Francisco on Nov. 21 of 1946 at the rank of Signalman Third Class.

After returning to Omaha he took up commercial photography which had been a hobby of his earlier. He married Joyce Anderson also of Omaha in November of 1947. They moved to Oregon in June of 1948.

He is survived by his wife, Joyce of Beaverton; his mother, Mrs. G. F. Jackson of Omaha (his father passed away just a few months ago); two brothers, Robert of Lansing, Michigan and Charles of Omaha, Neb.; and 1 sister, Mrs. Charles Van Auker of Baltimore, M. D.

Beaverton Group Plans Visits To Meet Neighbors

A "get acquainted with your neighbor" drive will be inaugurated March 4, by members of the Beaverton Seventh-day Adventist church. This is part of a nationwide endeavor by the denomination to visit two million homes and bring "spiritual" help to the people of America.

Lay-members of the church will visit the homes in teams of two. Pastor Running explained. They will stress an "every-day" religion based upon greater church attendance and family Bible study and prayer, and distribute a leaflet especially prepared as a "cure for worry." Young people of the church will also participate in the drive, he said.

"The only way to reach America's unchurched millions is for the lay members to work with their pastors in visiting their neighbors," Running declared. "This present crusade is not only to bring spiritual help to our neighbors but also to locate needy persons whom our Dorcas Welfare Society may aid. Branch Sunday schools and children's story hours for the unchurched will also be established," he said.

This program of visitation is one of the major Adventist missionary activities for 1950. It is being carried on in Europe, South America, Africa, Japan, the Philippines and the United States and Canada.

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
