The congregation in Puyallup numbers 300 communicants and over 400 souls. Puyallup is a city of 10,000 east of Tacoma and is in a

growing area like Beaverton.

Pastor Gerken labored here four and a half years and the Lord has showered his blessings upon Pilgrim. The congregation grew from 54 communicants to 153 communicants and over 300 souls.

Says Pastor Gerken: "I have really enjoyed the work at Pilgrim. The people have been wonderful and interested in bringing people to the Savior. I might also add that the city of Beaverton has been wonderful to us. Though the challenges here are enormous, I feel the challenges there also are great and I have the conviction that I should accept the call to Immanuel in Puyallup. Many thanks to all for their cooperation and kindnesses to me and to Pilgrim Lutheran."

Pastor Gerken will deliver his farewell address on Sunday, March 19th, at which time the children's class will also be confirmed. He will be installed in Puyallup on the 26th of March.

Pastor Gerken is married to Willene, nee Kerkman, and they have two 'little preachers', Norman Paul and Daniel John.

The congregation will meet Sunday to call a successor to Rev. Gerken.
