St. Senator Hits At Foes of CYA Before Kiwanis

Austin Flegel, state senator from Multnomah county, spoke to the Beaverton Kiwanis club last Wednesday in favor of the CYA. He was introduced by Ray Clearwater.

Flegel declared that the development of firm power is the most important economic issue before the people of this area today. With less than 10% of the river potential developed it is at present impossible for a large manufacturer to purchase power on a year round basis, due to overload. Arguments usually presented by opponents of the bill were met with rebuttal supported by excerpts read from the text of the act.

Fran Wood announced the Kiwanis spring concert featuring the Lewis and Clark Symphony orchestra under the direction of Boris Sipe, to be held March 23 at the Portland public auditorium.

Ross Selects Co. Crew Leaders In '50 Census Count

Astoria, Oregon, March 8.—Lyman Ross, district supervisor for the Bureau of the Census, announced today the selection of Vern Bright, Aloha; Mrs. Barbara Drake, Forest Grove; Mrs. Lorene Smurthwaite, Beaverton; Mrs. Ethel Rutz, Forest Grove; and Harry Therkelsen, Forest Grove, as crew leaders in Washington county for the 1950 census.

Ross said that territories will be assigned to them at the conclusion of their training which will be in Astoria on March 8 to 15 inclusive and each crew leader will be responsible for approximately 17 enumerators who will be selected and trained prior to April 1, when the actual job of taking the 1950 census will begin.

Local census committees are being appointed, stated Mr. Ross, to stress the importance of community cooperation in the work of taking the census so that an accurate enumeration may be taken. Agricultural groups are putting on special features to acquaint the farmers with the agricultural census under the direction of Palmer Torvand, county extension agent.

GOP Lists 2 More For Co. Commission

DEMOCRATS FAIL
TO ENTER ANY IN
PRIMARIES SO FAR

With the filing deadline on March 10, county Republicans have mustered two more candidates for the one position of county commissioner, subject to the May primary election. The Democrats, by press time, had failed to enter any candidates except for a few precinct committeemen.

On March 6, James Walters, 10543 N. W. Leahy Road, near Cedar Mill, entered the elimination for county commissioner. Walters has been with the county road department more than 22 years and, since about 1930, has served as one of eight maintenance foremen set up at that time, when the county took over all road districts. He is believed to be the last remaining maintenance foreman in the original appointment and is well and favorably known in his district.

G. A. Lemecke, Route 1, Box 177, Forest Grove, at present the juvenile court officer, made his bid on March 6 for the post of county commissioner. He promises that he will, if elected, give the best of his services to the people and the problems of Washington county.

His slogan is "Efficiency in government through systematic planning."

According to W. A. Tupper, county clerk, some Democrats have made inquiries but there is no definite announcement as to whether or not any of them will answer the call before the deadline of March 10.

New Citizens Of County Register, Eligible To Vote

Shortly after seven residents of Washington county had the rights and prerogatives of U. S. citizenship conferred upon them, in Judge R. Frank Peter's circuit court, February 23, the entire group made registration to qualify as voters in the coming primary election of May 16. W. A. Tupper, county clerk, assisted in the swearing in of the new citizens.

Those taking part in the significant ceremonies were: Robert Ruben Sullivan, Aloha, who was born in Quebec, Canada; Victoria Katayna Czaja, Beaverton, born in Poland; Teresa Laura Vaughn, Hillsboro, born in Trani, Italy; Margot Ann Efriede Franziska Wallis, Forest Grove, born in Bavaria, Germany; Mary Sophia Jones, Forest Grove, born in Norway; Hilda Emma Hayerty, Hillsboro, born in United States but who lost citizenship by husband's naturalization in Canada, and Zona Iris Williams Fuller, Hillsboro, born in Tennessee, who likewise lost citizenship by marriage in 1912 to citizen of Canada and renewed her oath of allegiance.

Sheriff Alerts With Report Of Escaped Convict

A hectic half hour or so was experienced by Dick Busch and his deputies, March 2, when at 5 a. m. report indicated that John O. Pinson, escaped Salem convict, had registered at a Hillsboro hotel.

City to Enforce Juvenile Curfew Hour of Ten P. M.

Closer enforcement of a ten o'clock curfew limit for juveniles 16 years or younger will be made, according to Mayor H. H. Jeffries, Beaverton, after city council action on complaints received March 6.

The problem of juveniles patronizing pool halls where liquor is sold and consumed was brought up to the council meeting and cited as a violation of state law. Under the terms of liquor licensing, no one under 21 years of age is to be permitted to enter or loiter in liquor selling establishments unless accompanied by parents or for business reasons.

This matter was referred to Dave Lofgren, city attorney, for a city ordinance and inclusion in his proposed municipal criminal code.

School Dist. 57 Jt. Proposes Start Of New Building

BARNES SCHOOL:—Construction of four rooms and basement of a proposed 12 room grade school for School District 57-Jt., at Park-Way and Cedar Hills Boulevard, will begin immediately after opening of bids on March 30, according to Thomas Smithson, member of the board. Occupancy is planned for September 1.

Plans are for a reinforced concrete building, similar to the C. E. Mason school recently built by District 48, Beaverton. A play area will be set up in the basement by present plans, with a cafeteria and arts-and-crafts room at a future date.

In the new building, 6th, 7th and 8th grades will be housed. In the present Barnes school, grades from the first through the fifth will be accommodated while the Tualatin View school, also in the joint district, will be used by first and second grades.

No name has been selected for the new building, as yet, and suggestions are invited from residents in the district.

March 30, bids will also be received on new toilet facilities for Barnes school.

Pinehurst Panel Protests Pickup Of Pet Pooches

A panel of six Pinehurst residents made outspoken protest, March 6, to the Beaverton city council: over the pickup of pet pooches by D. F. Kanneman, county dog control officer. Leader of the delegation was L. E. Parker, 1381 Chestnut Street.

The group angrily denounced the county practice of exacting a dog license which did not prevent the dog catcher from impounding their pets. They labeled the present campaign of rounding up canine delinquents as discriminatory particularly since the dogs are considered as a substitute for police protection in the recently annexed addition.

Other complaints concerned the lack of a city limit signs to indicate that Pinehurst is part of Beaverton; almost impassable county road as entrance to the project; no street lights; no sidewalks; insufficient signs to tell of "Children at Play"; imposition of a sewer charge, 100% of water usage, to pay for Beaverton's sewage treatment plant even though there is an operating sewer already laid.

City recorder C. Bryan Walker reported the Pinehurst pooch pickup was provoked by eleven calls from the area.

The city council agreed to do all in its power to solve the problems as presented by the delegation.
