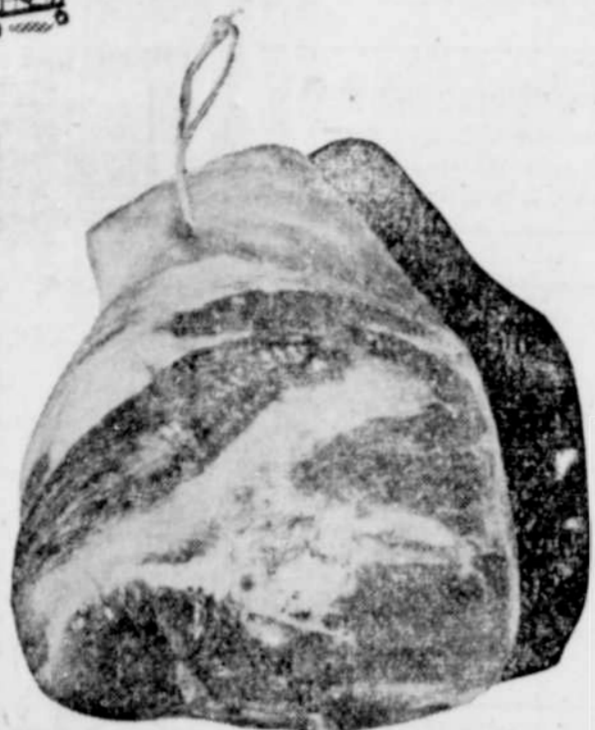

Catholic Church Conducts Drive For Relief Fund

Beginning Sunday, all Catholic churches of western Oregon will conduct a one-week campaign to collect \$35,000 for the Bishop's Fund for Victims of War. This amount will be the archdiocesan contribution to a five-million-dollar national goal.

The appeal will be made directly through the Catholic churches, with children in parochial schools making a separate appeal. There will be no solicitation of business firms.

Funds will be utilized to continue world-wide activities of the Catholic overseas agencies: War Relief Services of the National Catholic Welfare Conference and the Bishops' Emergency Relief Committee.

Since 1943, these two agencies have distributed almost 304,000,000 pounds of foodstuffs, medicines, and clothing, valued at more than \$129,000,000. This aid reached 62 different countries and was administered to the neediest everywhere without regard to race, creed, or color.

Administration costs are less than 2 per cent.
