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HUNTING & FISHING Around

Beginner fishermen become discouraged when failing to score; angling for the wary trout, particularly so when they have to drive a hundred miles or more to find decent trout fishing and then come home displaying an empty creel.

Some of that lost confidence can be restored and plenty of angling thrills will be in store for the guy who fishes for the abundant and scrappy little bluegill. He is almost always willing to accept your wet fly offering, even in the hottest mid-summer days and will rise swiftly to the dry fly no matter how poor the cast. Nite crawlers, crickets and grubs are also part of his diet.

The bluegill if properly prepared is a tasty dish and 3 or 4 (average size) per person make a most satisfying meal.

Try 'em sometime and you'll agree that the pugnacious little bluegill is the king of the western panfishes.

The lighter test lines and leaders offer advantages that many anglers are not aware of. A lighter test line naturally has a smaller diameter making it less discernable in clear water. Using a light leader a better drift is obtained and the lure is presented in a more natural way. Casting efficiency is increased and very little weight is needed to get the desired distance with flyweight lines.

Some day, just for kicks, secure

your lightest line on a fence post and gently reef on your light rod. Keep a tension on the line and you will be surprised how much strain can be exercised. In most cases the tip of your rod will go before the line.

Some fish may be lost but a higher percentage of catches will be made in a day's angling with a lighter, sportier leaders and lines.

Wonder if the angler of the Pacific Northwest ever stopped to realize how lucky he is—being able to fish for the big, powerful steelhead and the variety of salmon species which we are so fortunate to have in hundreds of rivers, streams and creeks of our great northwest.

Compare him to his cousin of the Atlantic Northwest who has to sheckle out \$20 per day to fish for the exclusive Atlantic salmon.

Where nearly all the streams are privately owned and the species is so rare that generally fly-fishing is the only method allowed in pursuing the Eastern salmon. Certainly this comparison cannot help but make us all realize how it is the obligation of the sportsman to help conserve our resources so that a condition similar to the one existing on the East coast does not happen here. Joining a sportsman club or conservation group is the surest way to provide an organized front against pollution, game hogs, and inadequate game laws.

Seems like a lot of patented, no snag, de-snag, snagless lures and devices on the market today. Some of them aren't bad and save the angler a couple of bucks in lost gear. However there are some instances where the above mentioned gadgetry doesn't work at all. Getting hung up in a tree is one of those exasperating circumstances that even the most experienced angler finds himself in at times. If it happens to you, don't waste effort (and risk breaking your leader) by yanking on the line or thrashing your rod around. Point the rod tip at the lure and slowly gather in the slack of the line until a tension is attained. Give your rod a couple of taps with the side of your hand—about 12 inches above the grip. With few exceptions the line and lure will be released. Average recovery will be higher on flies, light lures and spinners over heavy plugs.

Al McKenzie, recently re-elected as president of the Beaverton Rod and Gun club, proudly tells of an 11 1/4 lb. steelie caught on the Sandy river below Gordon creek. Al got the limit that day on crawfish tails and claims it's the best dawgone steelhead bait there is. "With a light casting rod McKenzie landed the sea-goat rainbow after a 15 minute scrap and used a 6 lb. test leader in fast water. That's taking it light and easy. Must have been an interesting tussle.
